W. J. Townley Sends Car Load of Prize Shorthorns to Fair.

A car load of W. J. Townley's famous Shorthorn cattle, left Hot Lake, Wednesday, to be exhibited at the Baker County fair the remainder of this week and from there to be taken to the Malheur County fair at Ontario the following week, thence to the Gem State fair at Boise the third week, and the week following that they expect to be spent in Salt Lake City at the Utah State fair. The cattle are the pick of the large fine herd which is kept on Mr. Townley's

ranch, known as the Mounds Farm, near Hot Lake. They are in the prime of condition and as Mr. Townley says, "They will have to go some up in that country if they beat us."

The Townley herd of Shorthorns are well known throughout the northwest and represent some of the finest animals of this breed in the West.

The cattle which he took on this trip have won first honors at Spokane and Portland fairs and champion ribbon at the Union County fairs and the Union stock shows.

The cattle taken include four prize winners belonging to G. W. Delay, who also has a number of fine shorthorns on the Rushes Ranch near Hot Lake.

The animals to be exhibited are: Cragielea Goods, junior yearling bull; Scottish Jane III, senior yearling heifer; Roan Duchess II, junior yearling heifer; Beau Baron, senior bull calf. These animals are from G. W. Delay's herd.

From the Townley herd are: Good Prospect, junior yearling bull; Ring-leaders Rose, senior yearling heifer; Mounds King, senior bull calf; Princess G, senior heifer calf; Mounds Violet, junior heifer calf; English Queen, Missie 132 and Princess Violet are the cows.

Donald Gale has charge of Mr. Townley's herd while Scott Callihan will look after Delay's exhibits.

Building Contract Is Let by Keltner.

The contract for the construction of S. D. Keltner's new hardware store was let last Saturday to John Oberg in competition with four bidders, declares the Enterprise Chieftain. As the excavation for the foundation is about finished, the erection of the building will start very shortly and will be pushed rapidly, with the idea of having it ready for occupancy by November 1.

In several respects the store will mark a new departure. Mr. Keltner will occupy the entire structure with his business, with salesrooms in the front, tin sheet metal and plumbing shop on the second floor in the rear, and warehouse in the basement, which will extend under the sidewalk. Thus the salesroom in the front will consist of two floors, the upper floor being in the nature of a wide balcony, and the center being open to the upper ceiling.

The exterior of the front, on the two street sides, will be white brick. White concrete also will be employed in parts, the whole effect being decidedly attractive. It will be the first white building in the business district of town.

Across the street, Zoph brothers have finished excavating for the addition to the Wallowa National bank building, and are putting in the concrete foundations. The addition at the rear will be finished first, to provide room for the bank while its quarters on the corner are being remodeled.
