LAMB PRICES HOLDING FIRM

THE PORTLAND MARKETS SHOW MUCH STRENGTH.

Swine Only Commodity Showing a Weakness of Any Nature.

Portland Stock Yards, Sept. 19.—There was a firmer tone in the cattle trade at North Portland at the week's start. Receipts were fractionally larger than last Monday, but were still small.

Weakness was indicated in the early trading for swine at North Portland at the week's opening. There was a much smaller run than the totals of last Monday.

The lamb market was intensely firm during the first day's trading of the week at North Portland. Higher prices were forced, with top lambs at \$8.50, or 15c better than any previous sale this season, or 25c higher than any recent sale.

Lumber Company Builds "Y."
Rose Lake, Idaho, Sept. 15.—What is said to be the best industrial Y. M. C. A. building in a sawmill town west of the Mississippi River, is being completed here. The building is being built with the personal funds of Mr. C. J. Winton and his brother, D. N. Winton, both of Minneapolis, the former being the President of the Rose Lake Lumber Company. Mr. Winton believes in helping men to help themselves and has attached the very wise condition to his gift that the men should provide the furnishings.

During the past week the enthusiasm with which the employees have raised among themselves the \$700.00 required for equipment must be a source of satisfaction to the President of the Company.

On Sept. 4, at a meeting of the employees the plan of the Y. M. C. A. for milltowns was explained by Jno. A. Goodell, Portland, Northwest Industrial Secretary and two Committees were appointed to conduct a campaign for the furnishings and in less than an hour there were thirty subscriptions totaling \$375.00, a little over half the amount required. With this enthusiastic start, the committees under the leadership of Axel Rosenlund, a former basket ball star, and G. E. Stokke, the Company engineer, proceeded to make a systematic canvass of the employees. By Tuesday night the total amount subscribed had reached \$500.00. The next morning before breakfast (which comes early in the mill town) one of the committee men had secured \$65.00 additional. The increasing enthusiasm of the men for the new Y. M. C. A. augurs well for the future of the Rose Lake branch.

The basis of operation is interesting as it illustrates the industrial plan of the Y. M. C. A. Mutual aid and cooperation being the keynotes all along the line, for instance: The employees provide the building and the employees the equipment and furnishings. In the maintenance, Manager Walter S. Rosenbury has promised that the Rose Lake Lumber Company will furnish heat, light and water and a cash appropriation equal to about half the annual cost of operation. The employees provide the other half with the annual dues.

The activities will be in charge of O. C. Thompson, an experienced Y. M. C. A. secretary, who will have an Advisory Committee of five men, two selected by the Company and three by the men. The members of the temporary Committee appointed by Mr. Rhodes of the State Y. M. C. A. to hold office until Jan. 1, are C. A. Fuller, Axel Rosenlund, G. E. Stokes, F. W. Kurk and John Johnson.

The building is a model of its kind and is arranged to serve not only the men and boys, but the women and girls of the community. The principal features of the building are the social room that will be supplied with easy chairs and benches and adjoins the room containing three bowling alleys, where ample seats are provided for spectators. A splendid gymnasium 36 x 70 feet affords not only a place where games will be popular, but where Church and Sunday School services will be held on Sunday and can be used for lectures and entertainments during the week. A quiet, well lighted reading room overlooks the river and just back of it are the baths and locker rooms. A special bath and toilet room has been provided for the women, as bathing facilities are not common in Rose Lake. President Winton has provided the best possible bath fixtures and equipment and expresses the hope that they will be kept in fine condition. A well equipped kitchen is also included. In front of the building a wide veranda extends across the entire building and is an inviting place for the men to spend their leisure hours between shifts.

At present the heating fixtures and bowling alleys are being installed and Sec. Thompson, with the aid of the Advisory Committee, is assembling the furnishings. It is expected the building will be opened with a big celebration about October 1st.

One of the first sawmill town Y.

M. C. A.s was organized in Cloquet in 1908. The first one in the Pacific Northwest was organized in 1911 at Doty, Wash. by the Doty Lumber & Shingle Co. Other firms that have helped their employees establish branches are: The Potlatch Lbr. Co., Potlatch, Ida., Inman Poulson Logging Co., Kelso Wash., The Sunset Timber Co., Ralmond, Wn. and the Booth-Kelley Lumber Co. of Eugene.

Hunters Urged To Be Careful

Emphasizing the destruction of property and human life caused by careless hunters, a warning issued by the Forest Service urges all sportsmen on the National Forests to use the greatest possible care to prevent forest fires and to avoid such accidents as caused the death of Forest Ranger Clark on the Cabinet National Forest in Montana last year.

Mr. Clark was mistaken for a bear by a careless hunter, who fired without waiting to be sure what he was shooting at. To show that such accidents are not uncommon, the warning quotes an estimate of the Biological Survey that between 150 and 200 persons are annually killed in hunting accidents in this country and that this number is increasing. Furthermore, it stated, 15 per cent of all forest fires in the National Forests are caused by careless hunters and other campers.

The National Forests, it is stated, contain the best hunting grounds in the country. The number of game animals is increasing on account of protection from forest fires and illegal killing which is afforded by forest officers. On many of the Forests, deer, elk, mountain sheep and other species are fairly plentiful, while small game is usually abundant. Bear, mountain lion, and other of the predatory animals are found on most of the Forests and the killing of these is encouraged because they prey upon domestic stock and the herbivorous animals.

The value of the forests for hunting grounds depends largely upon whether they are protected from fire. Forest fires destroy the range and breeding places of the game and often kill large numbers of the animals themselves, while a great many more are driven out of the country by the flames. Furthermore, streams flowing through burned-over areas are subject to such extreme variations of flow and are often so choked up with deposits of sediment that fish cannot live in them.

Each year sees an increase in the number of persons who visit the National Forests for hunting and other recreation purposes. Every effort is made to encourage this use of the Forests. The best indication of a man's fitness to be in the woods, the warning points out, is the care which he shows in handling fire arms and fire. None but the most inexperienced tenderfoot will shoot without getting a plain view of his game while the man who lets his fire escape or who carelessly drops a lighted match or hot tobacco ashes betrays at once his ignorance of the fundamental principles of woodcraft.

Prineville's Prospects

President C. A. Reynolds, of the Northwest Townsite company of Philadelphia, accompanied by his attorney, F. J. Geiger, have just paid a visit to Prineville to look over the company's properties there. They told the Crook County Journal that they had visited practically all the other towns in the northwest where they have holdings and that in none of them are the prospects better than in Prineville. They predict a brilliant future for this community and state that Prineville real estate is a better buy than a majority of the towns in the Northwest.

After Vacation Rest Supreme Court Gets On The Bench Again.

Salem, Ore., Sept. 12.—Among today's decisions of the supreme court were the following:

Carlton Lumber company vs. Lumber Insurance company of New York, appellant, appealed from Multnomah county, modified on rehearing; opinion by Justice McBride.

Hancock Land company vs. City of Portland, appellant, appealed from Multnomah county, suit to cancel assessment on real property, opinion by Chief Justice Moore, judgment of former Circuit Judge Harris for plaintiff affirmed.

B. C. Gunnell vs. Van Emon Elevator company et al., appellant, appealed from Multnomah county, suit for personal injuries, opinion by Justice Burnett, Circuit Judge Gatens' judgment for plaintiff affirmed.

A. J. Anderson, trustee in bankruptcy of the estate of Roy H. Wasson, et al., appellants, vs. Stayton State bank, appellant, from Marion county, involving an alleged preference account, opinion by Justice Harris, Circuit Judge Kelly's judgment for defendant reversed.

Rehearings were denied in Ream vs. Ream, Mathews vs. Chambers Power company, Meadow Land & Investment company vs. Manerud, Roney vs. Lane county, Fargo vs. Wade and Baldwin company vs. Savage.

How a Movie Director Made a Great Fortune.

In the August American Magazine is an account of Thomas H. Ince, the successful movie director, who was earning \$5 a day in 1910 and whose income each year now amounts to the interest on \$2,500,000.

Ince was one of the very first to insist on experienced actors. One day Bob Hilliard met him in Los Angeles. Bob had known Ince as a child actor and had heard much of his achievements, but he appeared almost offended when Ince suggested that Bob himself capitulate to the camera.

"Hilliard is one of the few actors who still hold out. In fact, the handsome stage star regards the film as the guillotine of the spoken drama. Still, when Ince invited him to write his own contract, saying that he would pay first and count afterward, Bob was tempted. 'I will think it over,' he said; but it so happened that Hilliard a few days later was wedded to a brewer's daughter possessing millions.

"It was quite the same with Billie

Burke, now intrenched at Inceville. Ince had made up his mind to sign the Frohman star, provided money would induce her. Like Ince, Miss Burke became famous almost overnight, and was enjoying the sensation of finding a four-figure cheque in her weekly pay envelope.

"When Ince offered forty thousand dollars for one month's effort on her part in the vacation season there was no sign of acceptance. Not until she gazed upon the spectacle of Ince directing a massive film production, and had become a daily visitor at Inceville, did she commence to listen. Even then there were the Frohman interests to pacify, and the consent of Florenz Ziegfeld was essential."

Canadian Scientist Back From The North Reports Copper Find.

Seattle, Sept. 12.—Bringing 1000 scientific specimens of Arctic biological life, and news that vast copper deposits on the Coronation gulf and Bathurst inlet are waiting to be mined, scientists of the Canadian Arctic expedition have arrived in Seattle. They will leave soon to report to their government at Ottawa.

Dr. Rudolph M. Anderson heads the scientists. Vilhjalmur Stefansson, head of the exploring division, is still somewhere in the north. The natural scientists worked independently of the exploration division.

"Explorers for years have believed that there were great copper deposits east of the McKenzie river," explained Dr. Anderson.

Although many of the deposits are evidently low grade, Anderson explained, there are seams in the amygdaloidal lava filled with pure copper.

Other scientists in the party were: J. J. O'Neill, geologist; J. R. Cox, topographer; Diamond Jenness, ethnologist, and George Wilkins, photographer.

Juarez

The first among Mexican presidents in patriotism and devotion to his country was Benito Pablo Juarez, after whom the Mexican city opposite El Paso was named. Among the self-seeking generals and politicians who have sought to use the Mexican presidency for the satisfaction of their own selfish ends, Juarez stands out as a man who was, if not like Washington, at least the Lincoln of his country. He was of full Indian blood, but obtained a good education and became a lawyer. While governor of his native state of Oaxaca he made a reputation for honesty and ability, which caused his banishment by the infamous Santa Ana. He returned to Mexico in 1855 and became chief justice. When Comonfort was overthrown by the church and military party Juarez became legal president, and after a war of several years he defeated the Unconstitutionalists and was elected

president by congress. The intervention of Napoleon III, who put Maximilian on the throne, brought on another war, but Juarez triumphed in 1867 and was re-elected president in 1871, holding the office until his death, which occurred 44 years ago. The Indian executive was as light to darkness compared with most of the presidents of Mexico, and he was retained in office by the popular will in spite of the opposition of the clerical and military reactionaries.
