LECTURES ON SALESMANSHIP

COURSE OF MUCH MERIT IS PLANNED FOR LA GRANDE.
Course Frequently Given Privately for Fancy Tuitions.

The University of Oregon, being a state institution, is desirous of reaching and helping just as many people in the state as it possibly can. It has already established and maintains a large correspondence department, through which about 1,000 residents of the state are receiving educational facilities which would otherwise be unobtainable.

The most recent development in this line is to send men into the field to hold classes, and in this connection Professor Robert McAuslan of the extension department of the university has come to La Grande. He is organizing a class for a short course in salesmanship, the sessions of which will be held at the rooms of the Y. M. C. A. from 8 to 9 each evening from Monday to Friday for three weeks, beginning Sept. 25. While this course is especially designed to aid salespeople and proprietors of stores, it is of educational value to all, and anyone desirous of self-improvement may attend without cost. This is the advantage the University of Oregon gives, for such courses are given privately and in some Y. M. C. A. institutions in eastern cities at a cost ranging from \$30 to \$100 per pupil.

There isn't a salesman or woman in Oregon who will fail to receive benefit from attendance at the classes of Professor McAuslan. If the University of Oregon finds it profitable to engage this gentleman to instruct the students in better business methods, and if the Meier & Frank company, the largest department store in Portland, were desirous of employing him at great expense during his vacation period—which they did this summer—it is certainly a rare and exceptional opportunity that the university is offering to all sales people in La Grande, and they should not fail to accept this generously provided instruction.

REGISTRATION URGED.

Need of Widespread Attention to Important Duty Cited.

La Grande, Sept. 19.—(To the Editor.)—The extreme slowness with which the voters of Union county are registering moves me to write this communication and call attention to all unregistered voters to the short time remaining for so doing as the books close on October 7.

Since May 19 the books have been open, and I am informed that less than 100 have registered in that period. There are at least 2,000 otherwise qualified voters in this county who have so far failed to register.

The Rev. A. C. Moses, manager of the anti-brewery campaign for the Anti-Saloon league in Multnomah county, stated yesterday:

"Down in Columbia county there is a town into which an Oregon brewery has shipped complete bar fixtures for a saloon, and has gotten a man to run a place there as a soft drink place until the state goes back wet in November, when he will get a brewers' agency permit and run a regular saloon. This information was secured first-hand. The manager of the lumber company there is up in arms about it. So you can see how the wets themselves view the situation."

The house-to-house canvass or poll being conducted under my supervision reveals one-third of the dry unregistered; wet practically all registered. If the ratio holds throughout the state, I fear that the brewers have good grounds for their confidence.

cepted. The railroad managers' did not reply up to the time we left Washington. Nor did we leave without knowledge of the president. He released us and knew we were going."

"We have always been in favor of arbitration," said Mr. Clifford. "We settle our disputes as far as possible by conference."

"The difficulty in arbitration," observed Mr. Barnhart, "is to secure a man who understands railroad operation from both sides and is neutral in his attitude. We have spent a great deal of money and months of time in arbitration before this. Please say that we know nothing about the situation since we left Washington other than what is generally known to the public. Our business here is purely concerning local railroad matters and to meet with officials of the railroad concerning them."

NEW CANDIDATE OUT.

Umatilla County Legislative Ticket Added to by One.

The east end of Umatilla county, with its large population, is asserting a claim to representation in the legislature, and the friends of Louis Hodgson, well known resident of that section of the county have persuaded him to consent to enter into the legislative race on the Democratic ticket, explains the Pendleton Tribune. Mr. Hodgson will run for the place for which J. R. Raley was nominated, but refused to accept. It is generally understood that one of Mr. Raley's reasons for refusing to accept the nomination was the feeling of dissatisfaction in the East end of the county that that portion of the county was not fairly represented upon the legislative ticket.

The list of candidates for the lower house from Umatilla county, as now arranged, will be as follows: Republican nominees—Roy W. Ritter and J. A. Best, both of Pendleton. Democratic nominees—W. T. Reeves of Stanfield and Louis Hodgson of Freewater.

For the senate—District Attorney Steiwer has no opposition. Neither has R. N. Stanfield, Republican nominee for joint representative from Umatilla and Morrow counties.

Gathering Wolverine Squad

Ann Arbor, Mich., Sept. 19.—From the classiest looking bunch of candidates assembled here since the days of Craig, Pontius and other heroes of the last Wolverine championship election, Coach Fielding H. Yost today is beginning to pick a team to uphold Michigan's honor on the gridiron.

The few veterans who return, stars in their respective positions, have been augmented by as fine a class of youngsters as ever responded to the call for early training.

To the usually important question of how many "M" men are available for the team, little significance attaches this year. Last year's eleven was not a howling success, and consequently when Yost lost eight of his fifteen veterans the team's enthusiasts viewed the fact with scarcely a murmur of complaint.

The Yost offense, of course, will center around Captain Maulbetsch, All-American half back. Working with him in the backfield will be Pat Smith, fullback, who has developed

ground gaining ability second only to "Mauley" himself.

A quarter and one halfback must be developed from the new material. Ziegler is trying for the quarterback job and Raymond and Sharpe, 1915 subs, for the position as Maulbetsch's running mate.

The line will present even more of a problem than the backfield. The center position will go to Niemann, a veteran, but selections for the remaining places are in doubt.

The mayor of The Dalles has issued a notice to the general public denying the report that he is promising jobs and increased salaries in order to secure votes for proposed charter amendments.

DORT AT ROUNDUP.

Northwest Auto Company Will Have Machine on Display.

In order that nothing under the sun shall be overlooked at the Round-Up this week in Pendleton, the two heads of the Northwest Auto company, Fred W. Vogler and C. M. Menzies, have brought one of the famous Dort automobiles with them. Mr. Vogler said:
