# Sporting News

WOMAN COACHES FOOTBALL TEAM.

## Y. M. C. A. Notes.

Basketball practice for the Y. M. C. A. is being held twice a week. The boys are content to practice basket shooting, instead of the regular playing during the warmer weather.

All the dormitory rooms of the association are rented. The association is making an effort to make the rooms comfortable and homelike, and the spirit of co-operation on the part of the roomers with the association is very gratifying.

Considerable repairs have been made recently in the building. Floors in the dormitory have been stained and varnished, re-plastering has been done on the walls where the plaster had fallen, the tables in the social room have been moved and leveled, the bowling alleys have been thoroughly overhauled and are now in excellent shape.

Ping pong has been introduced. From a spectator's standpoint the game looks very easy, but such an idea is quickly changed when they take a racket in their hands and attempt to play the game. Tournaments will be staged and much excitement is looked for during the tournaments.

The new game of indoor quoits will be ready for use some time during this week.

The association has sent away for a "thrift exhibit" and will, upon the arrival of the exhibit, display it at several advantageous points. The thrift idea is making great headway throughout the United States. In some cities thousands have attended the exhibits and the lectures. A thorough campaign is held at which the mills, the shops, the factories and the stores are visited and thrift folders are given away. The results of the campaign are worth while, and impetus is given to saving. People give more intelligent thought to the expenditures and the idea of just saving a small amount regularly is being adopted by many.

The social room of the "Y" will open for the season Thursday evening. The association expects to make this department a decided social feature. The regular rates which have been prevailing for the past year have been greatly reduced. It will be possible to buy chips at nearly one-half the former charge. Two pin boys have been engaged, and will give their entire time to the pins, and Thomas Barton, an experienced bowler and billiard player, will be in charge of the room. It has been decided by the games committee to have nights for the ladies, and three new bowling balls have been purchased for them.

**THE STEVENS FAIR TRADE BILL.**  
(The Southern Merchant, Atlanta, Ga.)

Every indication over the country shows that the big catalog and mail order houses are making a desperate effort to defeat the national legislation known as "The Stephens Fair Trade Bill."

This bill will be of the largest value in stopping price cutting on certain articles below the cost of production for the sake of "baiting" the people on to buying in other lines where prices are advanced to more than cover the losses on the special article sold at cut prices.

The plan of mail order houses through which they take standard articles that have a fixed selling price and sell them at less than cost, is demoralizing to the legitimate retail business, legitimate jobbing business and to the business of the manufacturers themselves and it is to stabilize prices and stop this character of cut-throat business that the Stephens bill was introduced in congress.

This is one of the most important measures of recent years in the interest of small dealers. When mail

order houses take nationally advertised goods that the manufacturers have created a market for and cut the price below the price that local retailers must pay for these goods, it simply drives the retailer out of the selling field in those lines and the catalog house, after getting this business at a less than cost price, makes it up on other goods so that the local merchant is hit from both directions.

It took several years to pass a parcels post law and when it was passed the local merchant in the country was protected through the zone system. The mail order houses made the effort to have a one-flat carrying rate on parcels post, carrying a parcel from ocean to ocean as cheaply as the same parcel could be carried at ten miles distant. Congress, when it passed the parcels post law, very wisely created the zone system, making packages pay according to the distance they travel, which was fair and equitable.

This parcel post zone system has been largely nullified through postal regulations that have allowed big catalog houses to ship supplies by freight to different points of the country and then distributing them against the spirit of the parcel post law which contemplated that packages should pay from their source of origin rates according to the distance traveled.

Manufacturers and jobbers and small merchants are all directly interested in seeing the Stephens bill passed and the big opponents of this measure are the small order houses which want no restriction placed on their unfair business. The advantages which the mail order houses have secured in the parcels post system, have been greater than the law itself contemplated. If they can kill off the Stephens bill, they will be still further equipped to combat the smaller merchants scattered over the country. The whole question is rapidly becoming one of whether the merchandising of the country shall be concentrated into the hands of the few great houses in the larger cities or whether the merchandising shall be done on an equitable basis among retail merchants through the cities and towns over the entire country.

## A Baseball Scout's Complaint.

Hugh S. Fullerton has a short story in the August American Magazine in which a professional baseball scout laments the tricks of bush league managers. One of them says:

"If a scout don't keep his eyes open those bush managers are worse than a bunch of salted mine promoters, so I don't ask any questions, but goes around snatching after Musser. Everyone in Muskegon knows all about that game, but no one knows Musser—new man. I had to hunt up the manager and take a chance of having acid enough to test his gold bricks. But this one was different. When I asked about Musser he said, 'Shush-sh-shhh,' and I had to walk him around in front of the mirror so the bartender can't hear before he'll say a word. Then he leans over and says, 'Shush-sh-sh! College man. Rich daddy. Pitching under fake name. Afraid he'll lose his amateur standing. Hired him to pitch one game, won a sockful.
