WALTER STRINGHAM WONDERS AT BINGHAM MINING ACTIVITIES IN UTAH.

Imbler, Sept. 22.—(Special).—Lyman Weeks returned to his home today after a couple of weeks in the La Grande hospital. He is improving as rapidly as could be expected. George Marshall, though rapidly recovering from the effects of being caught between a wagon and building several days ago, is still unable to engage in any active labor owing to a badly sprained shoulder. ranchers are attending the Round-Up. Walter Stringham arrived home Wednesday after a two weeks' visit with relatives in Manti, Utah. While in Utah Mr. Stringham visited the famous copper mines at Bingham, where he saw the blasting and excavating being carried on on a greater scale than any single day during the digging of the Panama canal. He saw the terrace track, 41 miles of it, with 51 locomotives—22 steam—1,000 cars and 10,000 men, all busy tearing down the mountain side; 41,000 tons of ore is the biggest record for one day. Mr. Stringham brought home some epsom salts and rock from which "Scat" is made, both of which are extensively mined near Manti.

EVOLUTION THEORY HIT AT

REVIVALIST VIGOROUSLY DE-CRIES PROTOPLASM AND EVOLUTION THEORIES.

Evangelist Marshall Will Take as His Theme This Evening "Worldly Amusements."

"Immortality of the Soul" was the

theme chosen last evening by Rev. Marshall, who is conducting a series of revival meetings in the Baptist church. During the course of his sermon last evening he said:
"It is a scientific fact that man's body is formed, as Genesis states, from the earth's substance. It is also a fact that the soul is a simple element, with attributes which cannot be destroyed. Whenever a man talks about protoplasm and evolution he is hiding his ignorance behind big words. Our bodies change ever seven years completely—always dying. The life, or soul, lives on, and it will when the sudden separation comes at death. "When anyone talks of leaving a Creator out of creation he exposes his ignorance to a remarkable degree. It is time that those who are teaching general science in some schools of our state should catch up with science itself and leave the discarded theories of protoplasm and evolution in the scrap heap of exploded theories, where science itself has placed them."
