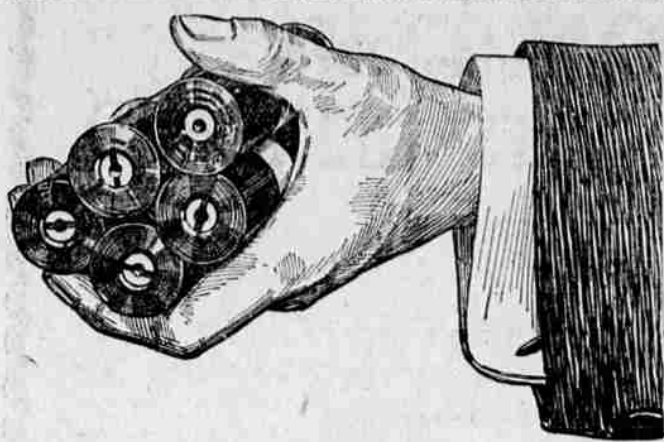

STAD FISHMAN SHOCKED.
Modest Kentuckians Shy at Girls' Bathing Suits.

Louisville, Sept. 16.—Automobiles filled with young people attired in long coats and bathing suits have been invading the West End during the past two weeks. Swimming parties both afternoon and night have been taking advantage of the long bar at the foot of Chestnut street. The Board of Park Commissioners has arranged wooden steps leading from the river road to the beach.

Fishermen who had never before seen young girls and women running along the shore in one-piece bathing suits were startled by the sudden appearance of a party of about 35 a few days ago. All of the swimmers dress at home and leave their coats and other wraps in the machines. During the low water the beach has been popular, but the sport will come to an end in the next few days, when the rise, which is expected Sunday, arrives. The bar at the foot of Chestnut street is the longest and most shallow bar on the Ohio River and has been exposed from Market street to Chestnut street during the past three weeks.

CEMETERIES ARE GARDENS.

Potatoes Planted in English Burying Ground.

New York, Sept. 15.—Potatoes have been planted in many of the English cemeteries instead of flowers this year.

There is something uncanny about raising vegetables in cemeteries, yet we know that the war areas of Europe are nothing but vast cemeteries. And as the armies evacuate the various positions they are promptly planted for crops. Not long ago a picture was published showing an old French woman guiding a plow up and down a great field, carefully avoiding the removal of thousands of little white crosses.
