Many La Grande people know Wm. J. Stack, of Baker, at present playing Shakespeare's plays in London, and will be interested in the appended

extracts from a letter recently received from him:

Memorial Theater, Stratford-on-Avon.—I am glad of this opportunity of writing you from Shakespeare's birthplace. I was asked to come up and play Hamlet during the Tercentenary festival, and besides the honor of playing the greatest part in the greatest of plays, I am making it a sort of holiday as well. This is our first visit here, and we are enjoying this lovely place greatly. The Avon is a beautiful river and we have been boating or punting nearly every day. The banks are gorgeous with the "long purples" which Ophelia gathered, and our boat passed and passed again under the thousands of "willows that grow aslant the brook."

Marie Corelli lives here at Stratford. She has a beautiful Tudor house called Mason Croft, and an immense and lovely garden. She wrote me a personal note of appreciation of my work in Hamlet and invited us to tea with her, and we had a long talk. We found her a most interesting person. She has promised to write me a play, though she has never undertaken one yet. She also invited us to go over to Broadway with her in her car. Broadway is the home of Mary Anderson (Mme. de Navarro), with whom I recently played Orlando and Romeo. Mary Anderson has come out of her retirement lately to play for the benefit of wounded soldiers, and an effort is being made to have her and me appear again in one of Shakespeare's plays. Perhaps it will be in "As You Like It" again.
