Penniless Admitted to Hospitals?
Philadelphia, Sept. 26.—Whether penniless laborers who have suffered accidents in factories or elsewhere shall be accepted in dispensaries; and where the money is coming from to pay for their treatment if they are accepted, is one of the subjects for discussion at the annual convention of the American Hospital association, which began here today. The question has been much hashed over and a certain part of the membership is said to favor excluding them.

Spokane, Wash., Sept. 23.—At the chamber of commerce recently the sportsmen had charge of a meeting, and the chairman for the occasion boasted of the truthfulness of sportsmen. "There," he said, pointing to a ten-pound trout caught in the Spokane river five minutes walk from the business district, "is ocular evidence that Spokane fishermen don't lie about their catches. I take great pleasure introducing to you the man who caught that fish." At once a bakers' dozen of the local sportsmen leaped to their feet while the true hero sat still and silent.

Former La Grander a Candidate.
James W. Cherry, several years ago an attorney in La Grande during most of which time he was a partner with Col. F. S. Ivanhoe, is the Republican nominee for circuit judge in the Seventh Utah district. Mr. Cherry's home since leaving La Grande has been in Mt. Pleasant, Utah. His father was for a number of years circuit judge of the district.

SCHOOL AIDS CRIPPLE BOY

Special Elevator Made to Accommodate Lad Who Can't Climb School Stairs Alone.

Spokane, Wash., Sept. 23.—Permission has been granted by the Spokane School board for the installation of a private elevator in one of the public schools for the accommodation of a pupil who is partially paralyzed and unable to climb the stairs. For a time it looked as though Donald Burcham would not be able longer to attend public school. He has been a pupil of the Bancroft school for four years and members of his family have wheeled him to school and home again. Recently, with the aid of crutches and braces he has been able to walk home, slowly and laboriously, each afternoon. Despite his handicap, the little chap has been able to make his grades and has been promoted to the fifth grade. Then began his trouble. All grades above the fourth are on the second floor at the Bancroft school and Donald is unable to climb upstairs and is too heavy to be carried conveniently. His father took the problem to the school board. He offered to install a small elevator in the building at his own expense. The school board consented. The elevator will not be public.

lic. It will be 30 by 36 inches, with a carrying power of 500 pounds. Mrs. Burcham and E. Clyde Miller, principal of the school will have the only keys. In event any other pupil is physically unable to climb the stairs, the elevator will be at his disposal. It will be regarded with strict regard for the building inspection requirements and will be safeguarded from the other pupils.

Must Not Slash Salaries.

New York, Sept. 20.—Any attempt on the part of baseball magnates to slash wholesale at contracts terminating this year will be strongly opposed by the Players' fraternity, David L. Fultz, president of the organization declared today in an interview with the United Press. Plans already have been made to combat such an attempt, but Fultz refused to make public the outline of battle. The Fraternity expects the magnates to make some attempt to cut salaries which were boosted when the Federal League was causing so much trouble. Many contracts have salaries stipulated in them while others do not. Some of them merely quote salaries for one year, with a provision that the following year shall see the same salaries paid while others quote salaries for one year with no provision for the other years at all. It is at this point, Fultz said, where most of the trouble will come. At the contracts contain the reserve clause which holds players over for the club for another year. Where the reserve mentions the player's salary and an attempt is made to make a radical reduction,

the fraternity is going to take a hand. It will not stand for indiscriminate slashing. Fultz said that many times magnates have attempted to tear up old contracts which bound them to good salaries for players and to execute new ones with smaller sums stipulated.
"We always have recourse to the commission in cases like this," he said.

American Bankers Celebrate.

Kansas City, Mo., Sept. 26.—Just one hundred years ago it was that American bankers began to reach out for small and large savings accounts; and the 4,000 American bankers association bankers attending their annual convention here today are celebrating the fact.

E. L. Robinson of Baltimore will tell about the century of savings banking. Professor Graham Taylor of Chicago will discuss the social aspect of savings. George E. Allen of the American Institute of Banking will tell of human nature in savings accounts. Victor A. Lerner of Brooklyn will talk about the centennial national thrift campaign and Irvin Cobb will make fun of them all. Other speakers will be Carter B. Keene of the Postal Savings service, William E. Knox of New York, E. G. McWilliam of Los Angeles, Harvey A. Blodgett of St. Paul, Minn.; and Frederick B. Washburn of Worcester, Mass.
