HOG PRICES GO HIGHER

SHARP INCREASE DEVELOPES IN PORTLAND MARKET AS WEEK OPENS.

Nominal Run Only of Mutton and Beef Seen—Prices Remained Unchanged for Those Commodities.

Portland, Sept. 25.—Hogs reached upward with a mighty swing at North Portland during the initial trading of the day. Sales were made right at the start at \$9.90 for good stuff in small lots, and later reports indicated a strong market at \$10. This means an advance of 15c over the extreme figures reached to date this season.

Only a small run of cattle appeared in the North Portland yards over Sunday. Trend of the trade was firm, with early sales of good quality in the steer division at \$7. There was a better average quality presented in the local yards than for some time past, and this influenced the early trading.

Very nominal supply of mutton and lambs put in an appearance in the North Portland yards over Sunday. Total run was but 164 head, and these were quickly snapped up at the market's start. Top quality lambs available sold at \$8.50, indicating that superior quality would have brought a still higher price. A general advance of 25c was quoted for yearlings and ewes.
