City Manager's Report.

La Grande, Oregon, September 27, 1916. General Manager's report for the week ending September 23rd, 1916.

To the Commission: The Fire Chief reports the number of fire calls two, which are as follows: September 18th, at 9:05 a. m. a call to the corner of 4th street and M. avenue, the electric auto of Mr. Kiddle was on fire, same was put out before the department arrived, some damage done. Nothing used. Sept. 18th at 5:10 p. m. a call to the corner of 2nd and Z avenue, to a grass fire, which was put out before the department arrived. Nothing was used.

The Water Supt's expenditures for the week were \$46.50, as follows: 3-4 inch tap 1707 V avenue \$2.88; repair work \$4.12; sewer connections at Mrs. Souder's place \$5.00; reading meters \$2.75, and lowering service pipe \$31.75.

The Street Supt's report is as follows: spent \$28.50 for team and driver \$4.25 for 2 extra men working on pound fence; \$15.00 for white wing; crosswalk cost \$5.32; nails cost \$1.20 and set of hinges for pound gate cost \$3.00. Sprinkled a part of the macadam roads and flushed business district cleaned gutters and catch basins, repaired two cross walks, fixed old town hose house and did some other small jobs.

The city treasurer's receipts and disbursements for the week were as

follows: Receipts from water rent \$480.64; improvement district instalments, \$538.32; improvement district interest \$248.94; Imp district No. 99 interest \$1.10; Imp. district No. 99 instalments \$4.00; electrical permits \$2.00; taxes from county treasurer \$1,281.32, and theater license \$25.00; disbursements water warrant paid \$7 and interest paid on improvement bonds \$405.

The City Recorder received \$33.90 on fines; \$3.00 for feeding impounded stock; \$67.73 for certificate of sale Lot 4, Block 63, Chaplin's addition for sewer 3, Section No. 1; one building permit \$.50; issued theater license per treasurer's receipt for \$25., and issued warrant on improvement district interest fund in payment of interest on Imp. Bonds Nos. 244-47-50 and 253 coupons No. 19; 564 to 585 coupons No. 7; 600 to 603, 611 to 616, 621 to 627, 642 to 651 coupons No. 6, for \$786.82.
