ROCK CREEK MAN IS DEAD

Haines, Sept. 29.—Henry F. Howard, aged 71, a dairy rancher of Rock Creek, was found dead yesterday morning in the corral near his home by Charles Castor, a neighbor, who had noticed the old man's absence and instituted a search for him. It is thought that he fell dead of heart disease last night while milking. His wife was in Baker and on her arrival in Haines was met by Castor, who told her of her husband's death. Mr. Howard had been in apparently good health up to the time of his death, his only ailment being occasional attacks of heart trouble. Mr. Howard had been a resident of the Rock Creek section for the past 14 years, coming to Eastern Oregon from Indiana, where he was born. He leaves no children. Funeral services were held in Haines today. Coroner Earl F. West was apprised of Mr. Howard's death today, but did not consider that the circumstances were such as to warrant an inquest. Mr. Howard was a member of Baker Commandery, Knights Templar and representatives of the order here, left yesterday afternoon for Rock Creek, to make arrangements in regard to the funeral.

GIRL WANTS BOY PUNISHED

Suicide Leaves Note To Her Mother With Strange Request
Chicago, Sept. 29.—Before she killed herself with gas Pearl Ross, 16 years old, imposed a solemn obligation upon her mother to punish her sweetheart. She left this note: "Mother—You have been too good to me, and I can't stand to see you suffer. I hope you will punish Bill Hammer if it is the last thing you do. "Pearl"
Mrs. Carrie Weeks, 4738 Prairie avenue, at whose home the girl roomed testified at the inquest that "Bill" Hammer was a salesman for Albert Pick & Company, and that the girl returned from Detroit and seemed despondent.
Mrs. Nellie Blakely, 1534 North Claremont avenue, a deserted wife, tried to end her life with gas. C. T. Jacobs was awakened by the fumes and called aid. The woman was taken to the county hospital.
Discharged from the militia because of disability and sent back home from the border, Herbert Parker ended his

life by gas in a room at 1027 North La Salle street.

"I'm going to take a rest," Fred French, 855 North Francisco avenue told his wife when he returned from work. She found him dead from gas in bed.

GIRL, 15, GIVES UP BLOOD

Supply Provided Twice For Serum And Offered Again

Long Beach, L. I., Sept. 15.—There is a pretty little 15-year-old girl here who has given her blood twice for serum as an infantile paralysis cure. Five years ago she had the disease and is in excellent health now, so during the past week she has twice given her blood, a total of 12 ounces.

Early next week she is going to Roslyn to give some more, and her ambition is to give 100 ounces of her blood, so that many children with Polymyeltitis may be cured. The girl's name is Ada Merrill, and she is the daughter of the Rev. and Mrs. J. W. Merrill of East Rockaway and Long Beach.

Miss Merrill read of the need for serum in the Eagle. She promptly wrote to Dr. Emerson in Manhattan offering to give her blood, but it was a week before she was answered. Then her own family physician and a state physician called upon her and took seven ounces. A few days later they returned and again they took blood, this time five ounces.

The girl has felt no ill effects. She has not been ill since the blood was taken and looks forward with pleasure to giving it again. Above all, she says, "It did not hurt," and she rather likes the looks of the scars on her arms.
