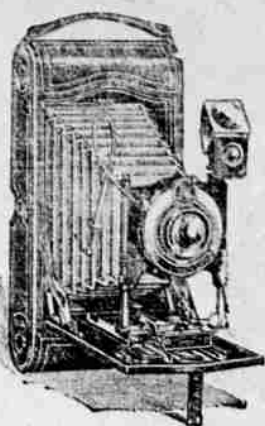

You could have knocked me down

with a feather. I was expecting to find a squaw or a bunch of Indians, but not a young and attractive looking girl, who could speak as good English as myself. I very soon found out that she was Tom's oldest girl, and was being educated at the Mission school at Noway house, but had been told by an Indian, who had seen smoke signals, from Grand Rapids, that Tom (her father) had gone with a white man hunting and timber cruising towards Limestone Bay. So she had made up her mind to head across Play-green Lake and then portage to Limestone, and here she was, and in-laden to stay. After spending a few days fishing for sturgeon we went south to English River and, as the lake was like a mill pond, we paddled about a mile to Eagle Island and got Tom's whale boat, that he had anchored in the harbor there. Some years previous Eagle Island was the center of a great white fish industry. Its harbor had a long wharf where the steamers used to tie up. Ice houses, drying houses, etc., everything to carry on the fish industry, and from the island to Winnipeg was 286 miles, but everything was shut up now, as the Lake Winnipeg had been nearly

fished out. Tom's boat was more like what we used to call a Columbia River center board boat, and carried about 375 yards of canvas. Next day there being a fair wind from the south, I showed Marie how to steer by port and starboard. We headed north. Tom curled up in the bow was half asleep. After striking the north shore, we passed over some willows growing in the water, and proceeding about two miles stopped at a rocky beach. Here I shot a small jump-bag deer, so we moored to a tree, dressed the deer and hung it, made a wickie-up (bush shelter) for Tom and Marie to sleep in, and made my bed up in the sail bow. nipeg, 286 miles away. In fact hardly any handling from off the saw onto the retail market.

Over 300 fight fans pawed the air at the Ring, a leading swat parlor, when the place was raided for army material. An hour later a good number of them were in khaki. Included in the surprise draft were a half dozen preliminary boys and a couple of semi-windup fighters who'll have a chance to try their jabs on the Germans this winter.

The ticket lines at the movie houses are the delight of the conscription agents. Every show has its line of patrons waiting for tickets because with the big "iron" pennies it takes a good ticket chopper about two minutes to sell an admission. When the line least suspects difficulty the military authorities sneak up and grab all eligible-looking men. Those who can show adequate papers are allowed to go; the others get the long haul to the police station—and khaki.
