FIRST JUROR IS STILL ALIVE
Country's Initial Panel Has But One Man Left Now

The only surviving member of the first jury impaneled in the circuit court for Union county is Terry Tuttle, of Summerville. The case was that of John Q. Adams et al., vs. W. W. Ross et al., and was for possession of mining ground in the vicinity of Sparta which was then within the original territory of Union county. Other members of the same jury who have passed away, but are well remembered among the pioneers of the county were: A. W. Rynearson, Green Arnold and Benjamin Brown. The jury returned a verdict finding the defendants guilty of forcible entry and detainer as alleged.

W. W. Ross, one of the parties to the suit, afterward became a member of the legislature, being the first Republican candidate for that office to be elected to the lower house from Union county. He met a rather tragic death. He was jolted from a wagon seat and his neck was broken in the fall while he was driving alone in a lane near the old John Bartness place five miles east of La Grande, twenty-eight years ago. He followed the business of mining and merchandising in the Sparta district; was never married and left no known relatives. Terry Tuttle, is 85 years of age and lives on the farm he originally settled upon in 1863, three miles east of Summerville. He has held the office of county school superintendent and was also elected a member of the legislature and holds an honorable record in all affairs, both public and private.
