

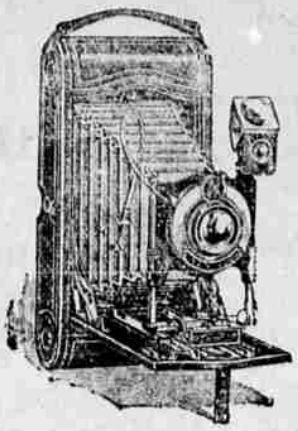

### TEACHING BACHELORS TO COOK

Young Men Learn How to Select, Buy, Prepare, Cook and Serve Food.

Corvallis, Ore., Oct. 2.—A men's cooking class for students that batch, has been organized at the Oregon Agricultural college.

In this class the men will be taught how to select, buy, plan, prepare, cook and serve food for their bachelor families for each meal of every day of the week.

The first course of the kind ever conducted at the college was instituted last year in response to many requests for advice in planning and cooking bachelor menus. A large number of men at the college are making their own way through school, and while they find it suits the purse to batch in small groups the service is not always satisfactory.

In fact it is sometimes a casus belli. So they have sought help from the domestic science department and will take a three-hour lesson a week for 12 lessons.

All meals will be planned to supply the food requirements of the individuals, comprising each group, in the most economical and palatable forms.

Under the direction of their instructor the men will prepare, cook and serve a scientific meal, and then eat it. They will then prepare similar meals in their bachelor homes for the family group.

By this method last year a group of men kept their living expenses, including board, room, heat, light and water, under \$90 a year. Fred C. Powers, Oakland, Oregon, their manager, says that the living was good and satisfactory.

### Prosperity in Oregon

**Iron Dyke Mine Forges Ahead.**

The Iron Dyke mine is forging ahead as fast as it is possible to develop a big property. The past month saw more ore shipped out than any previous month since the new company took hold and opened it up. The ore vein between the 300 and 400 levels is 60 feet wide and very little waste to be handled. The new concentrator is about completed and ready for operation. Though the capacity of this plant is 200 tons per day, it is said that it will take the present force 20 years to exhaust the supply of ore, running 8 per cent copper and better. The Iron Dyke has passed the speculative stage and is now considered a permanent mine with values and volume of ore large enough to justify its promotion to the head of all other copper mines in Oregon combined. Its output this year will probably run close to the million mark.—Pine Valley Herald.
