It was dull Monday in the marts today. Grocers carried small lines only in vegetables and fancy fruits, the over-Sunday shipments having been delayed. By tomorrow the usual full supply will be on deck, but today there was a thoroughgoing cleanout. Watermelons continue to hang on, and now command 1 1-2 cents per pound. The Portland rise in flour hadn't hit La Grande this morning.
