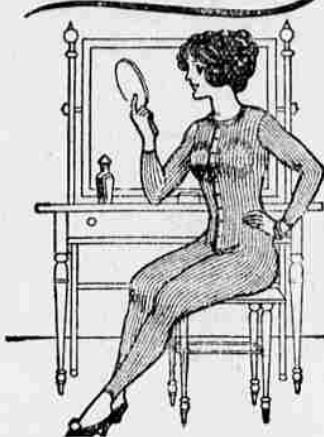
Rev. F. L. Loveland to Leave.

STRIKE SETTLEMENT IS NEAR.

Government Envoys at Seattle Say Prospects Appear Good.

Seattle, Oct. 2.—A settlement of the Seattle waterfront strike seems certain. William Blackman, United States commissioner of mediation and conciliation, and Henry M. White, United States commissioner of immigration, have issued a statement as follows: "Longshoremen are considering the question of stopping the strike and returning to work under the present wages and conditions, deferring wage arbitration for 10 days and not considering the 55-cent an hour straight time."

AN OLD SETTLER IS CALLED.

Willis Alexander Carnes Dies at His Home Near North Powder.

Willis Alexander Carnes died at his home near this city Monday morning at 1 o'clock after a long illness says the last issue of the North Powder News.

The funeral services was held at the Methodist church in this city Tuesday at 11 a. m. the sermon being delivered by Dr. Barnes.

The seating capacity of the structure was taxed to its utmost.

The remains were laid to rest in the city cemetery.

Willis Alexander Carnes was born near French Lick, Orange county, Indiana, September 19, 1839 and was 77 years and five days old at the time of his demise. He was united in marriage with Mary C. Morgan of the same city February 10, 1859, and to this union were born nine children of whom six sons and one daughter are

living—James F. and William L. of Hood River; John H., pastor of M. E. church at Seymour, Ind.; Edward A., Samuel R., Mrs. Anna Wicks and Geo. M., all of this community.

Mr. and Mrs. Carnes came to Oregon in 1884 and have resided here

since that time. He was a member of the Masonic lodge at Newton-Stewart, Ind. The gloves he wore while Worshipful Master of that lodge he has ever cherished, and at his request he now wears them as he sleeps within the tomb.
