Lee Teutsch in Cleveland.
Pendleton, Oct. 3.—(Special)—Lee
Teutsch, former Pendleton merchant,
is now located at Cleveland, Ohio,
where he is selling bonds and securi-
ties. Reports received by friends in-
dicate he has been very successful
in his new venture.

State Veterinarian Wins Suit.
Portland, Ore., Oct. 3.—(Special)—
Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian
and formerly of Pendleton, was win-
ner in the \$50,000 libel suit brought
against him by George R. Mokol for
an alleged defamatory letter written
by Dr. Lytle. The jury Saturday
found for the state veterinarian af-
ter being out an hour and ten minutes.
A charge in the letter to which Mokol
objected was that the writer had
knowledge of Mokol's dealing in tu-
bercular cattle. Mokol was nominated
for postmaster of North Portland and
he alleges Lytle's letter was a part of
the campaign against him.

Watch the Hole in Doughnuts.
Portland, Ore., Oct. 3.—Microscopes
may be served with restaurant dough-
nuts here ere long, so the diners can
find them. The hole is growing rap-
idly.

H. H. Haynes, president of the Mas-
ter Bakers association of Oregon said
today the high price of flour would
necessitate smaller doughnuts and
other pastries will also diminish.
Bread also is shrinking.

Other Counties Get Funds.
Salem, Oct. 2.—The state highway
commission Thursday set aside \$5000
of state funds for the immediate sur-
vey of a highway from Myrtle Point
to Roseburg. The survey was asked
by R. B. Murdoch, of Coos county, who
appeared before the commission. The
sum of \$2000 was allowed to complete
work on The Dalles-California high-
way in Crook county. H. J. Overturf
appearing before the board.

Albee Removes Caldwell.

Caldwell from the Portland Civil Ser-
vice board, declaring he did not believe
Caldwell was interested in civil ser-
vice reform.

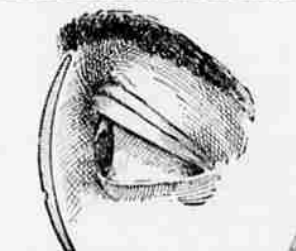
