WRITERS IN A QUANDARY

DIVISION OF AUTHORS MAY LEAD TO SERIOUS SPLIT THIS FALL.

Jack London Leads Opposition to Affiliation of League With Labor Unions.

New York, Oct. 3.—A struggle may result in the disruption sometime this month of the Authors League of America, whose membership of 1300 includes practically all of the famous American men and women of letters, is on. A goodly faction wants the league to be joined to the American Federation of Labor. The "antis," headed by Jack London and a string of notables think this move would be "inappropriate, disadvantageous and dangerous." The matter will be settled by referendum vote with members of the "antis" threatening to resign if the Affiliation party triumphs. In June a committee headed by Thompson Buchanan, reported to its parent committee that the league could profit by joining the Federation. The Federation had declared through several of its officers it would be glad to have it come in. The committee found that the Federation could help obtain for the authors, control of copyrights, now almost universally controlled by the publishers, and standardization of contracts. Just what the Federation would gain in a material way was not made plain. Its chief benefit, it was pointed out, would be the warm friendship of 1300 persons active in forming public opinions. Authors would hold to themselves any right to strike which they might see fit to exercise and also the right to bargain individually for their pay.

HIGH HEELS SAVE CITY

'Contributory Negligence' Laid To High Heeled Shoes

Spokane, Wash., October 3.—Wearing high-heeled shoes is contributory negligence when the wearer falls on a slippery sidewalk and sustains injury, in the opinion of a jury in the superior court of Spokane county. Ruth K. Taylor sued the city to recover \$12,500 for injuries she received in a fall on the sidewalk. When the city introduced evidence showing that she wore high-heeled shoes, the jury decided she was not entitled to damages.

BILLINGS' SENTENCE DELAYED.

Dramatic Charge Made That Real Bomb Throwers Are at Large.

San Francisco, Oct. 3.—Judge Bunne has postponed sentencing Warren Billings, the alleged preparedness parade bomber, until Saturday. McNutt dramatically declared the real bombers are still at large, and appealed for police assistance, promising to catch them.

Newly discovered witnesses throw suspicion on Adolph Schultz a former employer of the Giant Powder works.

Land \$100,000,000 Job.

Pekin, Oct. 3.—The Chinese government has concluded an agreement with the Siemens-Carey company, of St. Paul, Minn., financed by the American International corporation, for more than 2000 miles of railways. The cost of this construction will exceed \$100,000,000 and work will begin immediately.

This is the largest single railway contract ever signed by China.

Wallawa Ships Cattle and Horses.

Wallawa, Or., Oct. 3.—(Special).—Three carloads of horses were shipped from Wallawa to Chicago by A. B. Hall, a local horse buyer, and more than 500 head of cattle were sent to Coast point by local buyers from different parts of the Wallawa Valley on the cattle train. The shipment of cattle and horses has been heavy this month. The sale of sheep also has been good for this month.

Pay Day Delayed.

Portland, Oct. 3.—The city of Portland has delayed its monthly payday until funds from receipts of taxes come in.
