"THE BEGGAR OF CAWNPORE"

Triangle-Ince Story of India. Reviewed by Thomas C. Kennedy in Motography.

In point of impressiveness H. B. Warner's depiction of an English army surgeon in the service in India who becomes a physical and moral wreck through the use of narcotics, ranks with an elaborate and spectacular production given this story by C. Gardner Sullivan, an imposingly prolific writer of scenarios whose work is consistently satisfactory. "The Beggar of Cawnpore," an Ince production showing at the Knickerbocker this week, is in six reels. The piece has been staged on a large scale, there being expansive battle scenes and mass effects, which immeasurably heighten the value of the story since it was to be told in six reels.

Mr. Warner is a good type for the part and he is thoroughly convincing in his portrayal of Dr. Robert Lowndes. Lowndes puts forth every means known to his science to save the life of the engineer in charge of construction work at an isolated post in India, but he is unsuccessful. The natives flee, fearing that the engineer was a victim of the cholera. Driven to it by the barren loneliness of the parched desert, Lowndes turns to the use of a narcotic for relief.

When he returns to Delhi he confesses that he has indulged his desire for the drug to Betty Archer, to whom he is engaged. He breaks his promise to her and on the advice of her father, Lowndes departs from Delhi and his fiancée. Six months later he is seen in Cawnpore, living and associating with beggars and thieves. He again sees Betty, who is now married to Captain Douglas, and, inspired by a spark of his former self, he successfully weathers the tortures of a struggle to overcome his weakness. A coward, Captain Douglas is killed in the rebellion and the reformed Lowndes is reunited with Betty.

Charles Swickard produced the picture, and his treatment of the subject is commendable. Lola May is a charming Betty. Wyndham Standing, H. E. Entwistle, A. F. Hollingsworth and Wedgwood Nowell make up the balance of the cast. The effects in battle, street and desert scenes are striking and atmospheric. This Tri-

F. KURANISHI FOUND GUILTY

First Bootlegging Case Resulted in Conviction of Defendant.
Baker, Oregon, October 2—Taking just time enough to cast one ballot, the jury in justice court hearing the case of Frank Kuranishi, charged with bootlegging, returned a verdict of guilty Saturday afternoon. Sentence will be imposed on Kuranishi by Justice of the Peace Hubbard this morning.

The trial took up practically the entire day in court and the justice court room was well filled all day. W. G. Hocks and E. G. Osborn, detectives employed by the county authorities, were the principal witnesses for the prosecution, telling of their purchases of liquor in the Elks hotel and how the defendant served them beer and also delivered beer to them outside the building.

The defendant denied receipt of more than a legal quantity of beer, and that he knew of or was responsible for any illegal sales to any one in his place of business. He stated that the empty cases found there had come to Japanese roomers, who had left before the raid was made by the authorities.

LOAN BODY IS ORGANIZED

Federal Rural Credits Plan Taken up in Western Klickitat.
White Salmon, Wash., Sept. 30.—(Special.)—The meeting recently held here to explain the workings of the rural credit law to the residents of Western Klickitat County has resulted in steps being taken for the formation of Federal farm loan associations. S. H. Bodinghouse was elected temporary chairman and W. R. Wells temporary secretary.

Approximately 100 land owners have applied for membership and it is expected this district will take over from \$50,000 to \$100,000 of farm mortgages during the first six months of 1917. Plans are being formulated in Goldendale for a similar association.

MACPHERSON STRONG FOR RURAL CREDITS

Professor of Oregon Agricultural College Says Work Should Not Be Stopped by Rural Credit Act.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore., Oct. 30.—"The campaign for the passage of the rural credits bill in Oregon should not be stopped, even though the federal farm loan bill has been passed," emphatically declares Dr. Macpherson of the Oregon Agricultural college.

"Oregon," he said, "has her own problems of state development to solve, and these problems will never be solved until settlers can be placed on our available lands upon terms which will insure these settlers prosperity. There is a large field here which no federal bill, however perfect, is likely to cover."

"The measure now before the people of Oregon offers a very conservative beginning of a constructive policy of state development. Let us put this bill into operation, and on the basis of the experience gained within the next two years we will be able to take a step further and establish a system which will develop Oregon in a way that will soon eliminate the question."
