Trailed Home

By A Cougar

Engineer Fontaine aHs Peculiar Experience at Kamela—Animal Did Not Crowd Railroad.

Kamela, Oct. 4.—(Special)—To be trailed home a distance of two miles by a cougar and to be armed with a gun and not be able to make effective use of it was the peculiar experience of Engineer Joseph Fontaine yesterday evening. Mr. Fontaine had gone out in the woods to shoot owls which are numerous near Kamela and which have been doing damage to the supply of domestic fowls. When about two miles away he heard within a few feet of him the peculiar cry of the cougar. It was nearly dark and Mr. Fontaine although carrying a gun dare not take a chance against the cougar. He was trailed nearly all the way home by the animal which gave out occasional cries but considerably refrained from crowding the railroad man in his retreat.

Fulton and the Clermont.

The first trip of Robert Fulton up the Hudson river in the Clermont was thus described in the American Citizen of Aug. 17, 1810:

"Mr. Fulton's Ingenious Steam Boat, invented with a View to the Navigation of The Mississippi from New Orleans upwards, Sails today from the North River, near the State Prison, to Albany. The Velocity of The Steam Boat is Calculated at four miles an hour. It is said that it will make a progress of two against The Current of The Mississippi, and if so it will certainly be a very valuable acquisition to the Commerce of The Western States."

According to Edward Hagaman Hall's history, the Clermont made the trip to Albany in thirty-two hours. The state prison referred to stood on the block in New York now bounded by Washington, West Tenth, West and Charles streets, in old Greenwich village.

Mexico's Tiny Church.

Mexico, for a country that is so poor, boasts some wonderful big and fine churches, and it also has what is claimed to be the smallest church in the world.

It is situated at Penon, near the City of Mexico, and is a rude affair, yet it serves all purposes, as the local population is small. It has a "seating capacity" of about ten, though there are in fact no seats. The place is a favorite one for wedding ceremonies, though the altar is so small that only the couple to be married can stand in front of it.

The average person has to stoop in entering the door, but that encourages humility and is a good thing. The little edifice is crowned with two miniature towers with a bell in each, and these bells are rung as ceremoniously as those of the famous cathedral in the capital city.—Pathfinder.

Ice Mine Freezes Only In Summer.

At Condersport, Pa., is the strangest mine in the world. It is an ice mine, which freezes in summer and thaws in winter. Charles Arthur Vandermeulen says in the Scientific American that it is a pit forty feet deep and from ten to twelve feet in diameter, up which pours a peculiar cold mist which comes from openings found all the way from the top to the bottom.

"As soon as warm weather arrives frost appears on the walls of the shaft and soon tiny icicles form rapidly, until in the warmest weather huge icicles, often two feet thick, reach from the top to the bottom of the mine." Geologists can offer no explanation. The owner built a shed over the mine, but had to tear it down because as soon as the sun's rays were cut off the ice melted. Its normal thaw sets in in October.

Orange Peel Oil Is Explosive.

Everybody knows the flavor of an orange peel, but not everybody knows what causes that flavor. It is due to the oil contained in little cells in the rind. If the peel is bent so as to strain these oil laden cells the oil bursts out often as a visible spray and usually perceptible to our sense of smell and often as a greasy film on the fingers.

The peel may be so bent as to rupture a large number of these cells at one time and to fill the air with an oily mist. If at the moment of bending a lighted match is applied by an assistant a decided explosion will follow. This experiment is most successfully performed in a darkened room or in a room wholly dark except for the light from the match.—Popular Science Monthly.

WANT ENGLISH TAUGHT TO ALL

Washington, Oct. 4.—The organization of the National Committee of One Hundred to induce a large number of non-English-speaking immigrants to attend night schools and learn English has been practically completed by the United States Commissioner of Education, P. P. Claxton.

The Honorable John Price Jackson, who is the Pennsylvania State Commissioner of Labor and Industry, has been appointed chairman of the National Committee of One Hundred, and Harrison H. Wharton, specialist in the education of immigrants in the Bureau of Education, has been designated by Commissioner Claxton to direct the America First Campaign of the Bureau of Education and the committee of One Hundred, in the capacity of chairman of the executive committee. Other officers and members of the executive committee have also been appointed to act until such time as the Committee of One Hundred can meet and complete its organization.

A complete plan of activity is being outlined by the chairman of the executive committee. This plan will enlist the active co-operation of every governmental agency, organization and individual interested in the education and welfare of immigrants.

The appeal for co-operation already sent out by the Bureau has met an enthusiastic response from every section of the country. Several national organizations reaching the immigrant industrially educationally and otherwise are already co-operating. Foreign-language newspapers have agreed to print articles on the advantages of attending night schools,

while national organizations of immigrants are taking steps to reach thousands of non-English-speaking members.

WRONG IMPRESSION EXISTS

Department of Agriculture Does Not Recommend Any Make of Tractor

Washington, D. C., Oct. 4.—There have come to the attention of the United States Department of Agriculture items appearing in the press which are so framed as to give readers the impression that the Department in its publications has praised or recommended a farm tractor of a particular make.

As the Department has not done this and, in fact, systematically refrains from recommending any particular make of tractor or other machine, the public is warned to regard as false any statement asserting or implying such recommendation by the department.

Would Shorten Lord's Prayer

St. Louis, Mo., Sept. 30.—Prominent clergymen and laymen of the Protestant Episcopal Church were gathered here today for the opening tomorrow of the church's triennial convention which will continue through the month.

A sub-committee of the Commission on Revising the Book of Common Prayer will recommend the omission from the Lord's Prayer of the words "For Thine is the Kingdom and the Power and the Glory Forever, Amen." In requesting the omission the sub-committee will say the words constitute a part of the Doxology added by early translators and that they are not in the original text of the Holy Scriptures.

"The omission, if adopted, will make the Episcopal version of the prayer identical with the Roman Catholic. It is expected that opposition may develop.

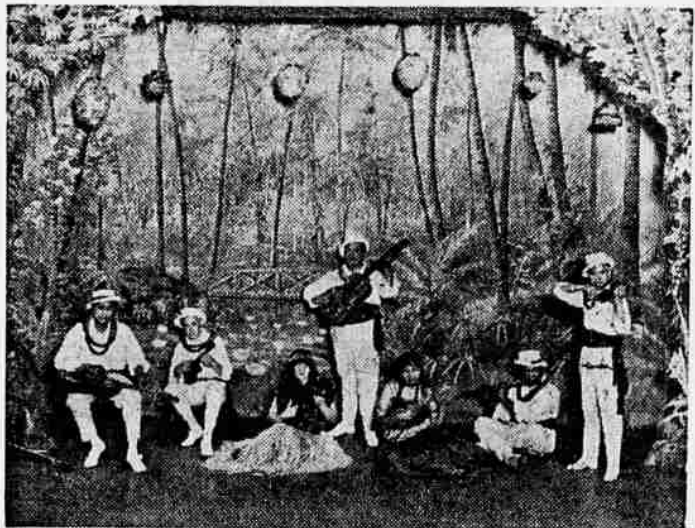
