CLARKE STANDS FOR MR. HUGHES

Marshfield, Ore., Oct. 4. (Special) —The flop of the Democratic Party on the Exemption of Panama Canal tolls for American shipping and the damage done to Oregon industries was one of the topics discussed by Hon. A. E. Clarke of Portland at a speech delivered at the Republican Rally held here tonight. Mr. Clarke said in part:

"The record of our Democratic brethren is a record of broken platform pledges, shifting policies, war taxes in a time of peace, public extravagance, diplomatic defeats abroad, uncertainty, doubt, vacillation

at home. Let me submit the proofs. "During the campaign of 1912, in an address at Washington Park, New Jersey, Mr. Wilson said:

"Our platform is not molasses to catch flies. It means business. It means what it says. It is the utterances of earnest and honest men, who intend to do business along these lines; who are not waiting to see whether we can catch votes with these promises, before they determine whether they are going to act on them or not. The American people are taking notice in a way in which they never took notice before. Gentlemen who talk one way and vote another are going to be returned to very quiet and private retreats."

"Measured by this rule, let us see who now should be retired to very quiet and private retreats." The Democratic platform of 1912 declared: "We favor exemption from tolls of American ships engaged in coastwise trade, passing through the Panama Canal."

"The Panama Canal is an Ameri-

can enterprise, designed by American brains, built by American money, and traversing American soil; this country having obtained the perpetual right to occupy and control the Canal Zone. A Republican Congress passed and a Republican President signed a bill exempting from tolls, ships engaged in coastwise trade. During the campaign in which he sought election, this platform declaration, as well as the Act of Congress, were repeatedly referred to and approved by Mr. Wilson. In response to a diplomatic suggestion by Great Britain that the question whether the Act was in conflict with any existing treaty should be arbitrated, he retorted in a public address that there was nothing to arbitrate; a view that was enthusiastically endorsed and editorially commented upon by the Democratic press of the nation, and of Oregon in particular. This measure was designed to encourage coastwise trade and to develop our merchant marine. It was particularly helpful to the Pacific coast. Its provisions operated directly to the advantage of our great lumber industry and other industries. What we need is markets. The distance our products are from market is not measured in miles, but in freight rates; and the exemption from tolls of ships carrying those products to eastern points was intended to render these markets accessible to us. Yet despite these facts and these promises, early in this administration the act was repealed at the insistent demand of Mr. Wilson. No explanation was ever given of this extraordinary change of front, other than some vague suggestion from the president that certain international complications required the repeal. What were the influences at work? England made a pretense of treaty right and demanded the repeal. She won. So did the Canadian Pacific Railroad Company, and all the other transcontinental railroads that for so many years successfully fought the construction of the canal, until the strong hand of Roosevelt beat them back. Low freight rates for our products to the southern and eastern seaboard points would be a fine thing for us and a good thing for the consumers of the middlewest and east, but it would be a bad thing for the Canadian and American transcontinental railroads. It was a case of Great Britain and the railroads on one side, platform promises and the people on the other, and the people lost."

FAIRBANKS NEAR TO PORTLAND

Will Speak in Willamette Valley Frequently on Way North

Portland, Oct. 5.—Charles Warren Fairbanks, of Indiana, Republican nominee for Vice-President of the United States, and ex-Vice-President from 1905 to 1909, during the second term of President Roosevelt's administration, will arrive in Portland late tomorrow.

At a meeting in the Armory at 8 o'clock, he will speak on the vital issues of the campaign.

His address here is to be made the occasion of a big Republican rally. Many persons from outside of Portland, including delegates to the Conference of the Oregon Hughes Alliance, which holds morning and afternoon sessions here tomorrow, will attend the Armory meeting.

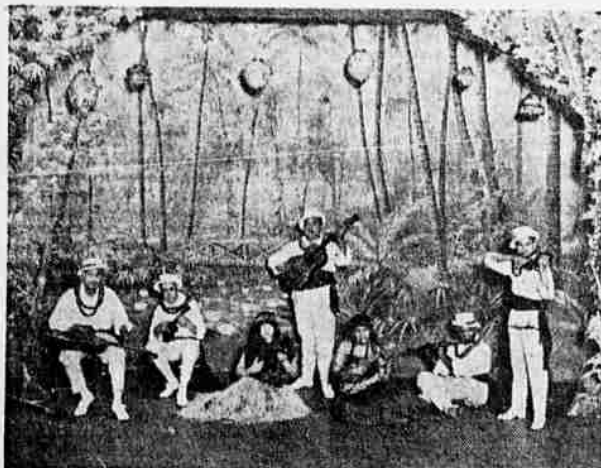

Charles Warren Fairbanks is the only living ex-Vice-President of the United States. He was nominated as President Roosevelt's running mate for the campaign of 1904, by unanimous vote of the Republican National convention.

At the time of his nomination he was serving his second term as United States Senator from Indiana. He was elected Vice-President with 337 of the 476 electoral votes, to 139 for Henry Gassaway Davis, the democratic vice-presidential nominee.
