It was the custom several years ago for the school teachers of the county to make out a "Roll of Honor," which included a list of those proficient in their studies and also who were neither absent nor tardy during the month. Such a list of the La Grande schools was published October 7, 1892. While many of the names of those who have long since moved away from La Grande are omitted the names of others who are now engaged in the advanced affairs of life appear as follows:

One of the names on the list is that of Elva Reed, who has probably reached farther from home than any of the others. Miss Reed left New

The Hayes-Tilden Election.
(From the Boston Globe)
In the year 1876 Samuel J. Tilden was the Democratic candidate against Rutherford B. Hayes for the Republicans. The first returns seemed to show that Tilden had been chosen. This would have been the first country-wide victory for the Democrats since the Civil War, a happening startling enough in itself.

The Hayes managers had the wit to claim the election. The country was bewildered. Tilden seemed to have a majority of the electoral college. When the electoral vote was taken, two sets of electors appeared from four states—Florida, Louisiana, South Carolina and Oregon. If the Republicans were judged victors in all of the states, Tilden would lose the election by 185 to 184.

The constitution contained no provision for deciding such a contest. The house of congress decided to appoint an electoral commission of 10 members of congress and five justices of the supreme court. The personnel of this commission was, of course, preponderantly Republican, as that party had been in control of the government since the war. One and all of the contests were decided in favor of the Republicans and Hayes became

president by one electoral vote. Had not Tilden used the utmost tact with his followers and accepted the verdict cheerfully, the situation would have been highly dangerous. As it is, many historians believe that he was cheated out of the presidency.
