PRISON BREAK FRUSTRATED
Salem, Ore., Oct. 9.—(Special)—Willard Tanner, slayer of Roy Wallace in Portland in 1912, and Hazel Erwin, his accomplice, made a sensational attempt to escape from the Oregon Penitentiary early Sunday. The break was foiled by Mrs. Carrie Kersch, serving a term for manslaughter.

Mrs. Kersch broke away from Tanner, who was trying to choke her into submission, and screamed for help. Before attacking Mrs. Kersch, Tanner, with the aid of Hazel Erwin, bound and gagged Nonnie Williams, a negro girl imprisoned for her part in a stabbing affray in Portland a few months ago.

The affair took place in the women's department of the penitentiary, access to which Tanner gained by tunneling through a heavy brick wall from the Bertillon room on the second floor of the prison.

The attempted break was the culmination of a carefully laid plot by Tanner and the Erwin girl to gain their liberty.

Tanner had been missing for 110 days. He disappeared the afternoon of September 29, and it was generally believed he had made his escape by passing out of the prison with a crowd of visitors who had been inspecting the prison that day. Superintendent
