CRICKET FLAT ROAD IS USED

BIG FARMING TERRITORY HAS DOWN HILL HAUL TO RAILROAD NOW.

La Grande Man One of First to go Over It—New Bridge Is One of Largest in the County.

The Cricket Flat road to Palmer Junction is now in such shape that it can be traveled but is not in good shape and won't be until next Spring when the winter snow will have settled it, reports George Hunting Currey, who has returned from an automobile trip over the new road. He crossed the magnificent new county bridge over the Grande Ronde river just above Palmer Junction—a bridge that is as long or longer than any other bridge structure in the county, and gives the Cricket Flat district, north of Elgin much nearer railroad facilities.

The new road puts a part of the Cricket Flat within three or four miles of railroad facilities whereas it was formerly many miles away, and the road when in good shape will give a down hill pull entirely to railroad facilities from the entire Cricket Flat district, whereas the road into Elgin is replete with hills of varying degree of length and steepness. It is anticipated that a warehouse will be built at Palmer Junction so the great yields of grain north of Elgin can be hauled either to Elgin or Palmer Junction. The new road is reached by leaving the Wallowa road at the Elmer Knight place, near the historic watering trough. It winds west and North until it reaches the newly constructed roadbed, and, with down-hill pull all the way, makes a couple of easy switch-backs before dropping down on the Grande Ronde river. The distance from Elgin to Palmer Junction over the new road is 17 miles, but the highway was not constructed for the purpose of giving closer connections between Palmer Junction and Elgin, so much as to give a down-hill pull for the Cricket Flat people to railroad facilities. As soon as the highway is settled and packed, it is expected it will be a popular cut-off for many in that vicinity seeking access to the railroad.

UKULELES IN BIG DEMAND

Government Agent at Honolulu Reports Growing Demand That Can't Be Met—Instrument Popular Everywhere.

The plaintive ukulele is coming into its own on a large commercial scale, according to accounts from Government Commercial Agent Taylor at Honolulu.

It is not only in La Grande and other Pacific coast towns that the little instrument is in favor. A report from the government agent at Honolulu declares the demand for the instrument is far ahead of facilities for manufacture in Hawaii. At this time last year the demand was for an output of about 600 instruments a month. Now it calls for 1600 a month.

There are eight factories in Honolulu and many small makers scattered around the islands. A new company has been organized to make 2000 a month and there is a craze to buy stock. The mechanics are mainly Hawaiians and Portuguese.

The originator of the ukulele, a Portuguese, who is now the president of a company making them, is still working actively in his own factory and getting out 700 a month.

The main thing in making the instrument is in getting well-seasoned koa wood and then shaving it skillfully with the peculiar grain.

Prices range now from \$4 to \$30. The finest are decorated with bead work, which adds to value without materially improving the tone.

It is expected that 36,000 ukuleles will be shipped to the United States this year.

OREGON RANKS LOW IN NORMAL SCHOOLS

U. S. BUREAU OF EDUCATION REPORT UNCOMPLIMENTARY TO STATE'S SCHOOL POLICY.

Pendleton, Ore.—Oregon is one of the most poorly equipped states in the Union for the training of teachers, according to the United States Bureau of Education.

Only five states in the Union have less normal equipment than Oregon. Oregon has one Normal School and forty states have more than one. New York has 18, Pennsylvania 18, Massachusetts 12, California 8, Washington 3 and Idaho 2.

The report of the Bureau of Education shows that even the little state of Idaho, with a population only half as large as that of Oregon, is spending more than twice as much for Normal Schools as is this state.

The same report urges that Normal Schools be located in the railroad centers with public schools sufficiently large to give teaching practice to the Normal students.

State Superintendent Churchill's annual report shows that of the 6055 teachers in Oregon last year but 791, or 13 per cent, were Normal School graduates. The same official estimated that 1000 new teachers are needed each year and the present Normal school is turning out but 150. The majority of Normal trained teachers are shown to be teaching within a small radius of Monmouth, although Eastern Oregon pays on the average of \$10.41 a month more for teachers than does the Willamette Valley.
