Sporting News

Two games with Baker second team for the second team of the high school squad now appear sure. It is proposed one of them be played in La Grande and the other in Baker, the Baker game to come last according to present plans.

First Team Plowing Along.
Several days intervene before the first stringers get a chance to redeem themselves from the Walla Walla disaster. Pendleton high school, which fell before La Grande last year by a 3-0 score, comes to the La Grande gridiron the last of October, and unless some games are picked up in the meantime, there will be no week-end attractions outside of what the second team may supply between now and that time.

New York, Oct. 12.—Baseball as she is spoke across the Pacific, while crude, conveys to America the fact that the national game of the United States rapidly is growing in popularity among the Australians. A copy of the Sydney Argus, received in New York today, has half a column of its space devoted to baseball games, the details of several contests being included. If one is to take the word of the Argus' writer for it, professional baseball in America and the amateur brand in Australia are widely separated. "The Collingswood-Hawthorn game was a splendid fight for five innings," the Argus reporter writes, and continues: "But Hawthorn's sixth brought five runs and they won by 10 runs to six, Martin, the Hawthorn's pitcher, struck out 14 batters and did some good hitting."

The visit of the White Sox and Giants to the far-off continent has had its effect. Baseball is being given more attention in Australia than in any foreign country, and recently a letter was written to Garry Herrman, president of the National Baseball commission in the United States, asking interpretation of some of the rules. Reports from the Antipodes say efforts are being made to organize a league of professional clubs.

Leaguers in Barnstorming Tour.
Dallas, Tex., Oct. 12.—Several big league baseball stars are in the line up of the team which Joe Gardner, owner of the local Texas league club, took with him today on a barnstorming tour through West Texas, New Mexico and Arizona.

The following players are making the trip: Tri Speaker, Claude Cooper, Owen Wilson and "Happy" Crouch, outfielders; Rozar Hornsby, Arch Tanner, Chick Knaupp, Tullos, Ens, Al Gardner and Snedecor, infielders; F. Snyder and William Alexander, catchers, Cliff Hill, Compers, Sewell, Lewis and Conley, pitchers. All of the players are native Texans, with the exception of Crouch from Ohio,

Ens from Missouri, Conley from Pennsylvania and Snedecor from Alabama.

SAVING THE SEED CORN

Most Mature Ears Should Be Snapped Off, Later Husked, and Then Properly Dried.

In order to secure corn, much of which has undoubtedly been very seriously damaged by the early frost, suitable for seed for next season's crop, farmers should go through their fields before cutting the corn for silage and snap off all of the more mature ears which show reasonably good denting.

"The early frost has caught a good deal of the early seed corn in the milk and much of it will be unfit for seed purposes," says G. R. Hyslop, specialist in field crops at the Oregon Agricultural College.

"Seed corn will undoubtedly be a very scarce article next spring.

"By going through the field and snapping off the more mature ears, farmers will frequently be able to secure satisfactory seed. These ears should be husked out within a few days and stored on the drying rack recommended by the college, in some place that is warm with a current of air. Most of the immature corn may be dried in sufficiently good condition to germinate and produce good corn next year.

"This season has been late as to growing and early as to frost. It very forcibly demonstrates the necessity for an early to a medium maturing variety of silage corn, both from the standpoint of quality of silage and ability to secure sufficient seed to keep up the crop.

"Under no condition try to store the immature corn in bulk or on shelves or in sacks. If you do, it will certainly mold. It should be put on racks or on wires, or should be tied up with string so that no two ears touch and so that the air has access to each ear. Put the corn in a place that is warm and in a draught and it will dry out quickly and without sprouting. If put into a place that is warm without ventilation the immature corn is likely to sprout at once. If put into a cool place without ventilation, the tendency is for it to mold and sour. Corn will successfully stand 130 degrees, F."

"Every farmer should save enough of his best mature seed and dry it in order to be certain of a seed stock for next year."

Card Playing Ordinance Up.
Baker, Oct. 11.—The ordinance regulating pool rooms and cigar stores in which card playing is carried on as a matter of business and which will do away with any private card rooms, was placed on first reading by the city

commissioners yesterday and went over for second reading. It provides that in no places where cards are played shall there be any room having doors of any kind or any place for card playing which is not open and can be seen from the outside. It carries an emergency clause and will take effect immediately on its passage and signed by the mayor.

French Beards Must Go.

Paris, Oct. 12.—A French general estimates that 120 tons of fur will be shed by the poilus as a result of the order for all ranks to get rid of their beards. The measure was taken because the gas masks do not fit all de-

signs of foliage, thus letting in poisonous fumes. Mustaches are still permitted.

Policemen Get Bonus.

Detroit, Oct. 12.—James Couzens, Detroit's multi-millionaire police commissioner, today announced the establishment of a bonus system for members of the Detroit police force. The bonus, provided personally by Couzens, will amount to about \$10,000 annually. It is believed to be the first of its kind ever established in the United States.
