Pendleton, Oct. 11.—"And they lived happily ever afterward."

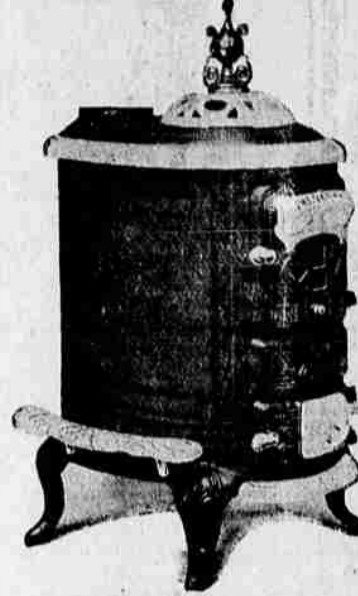

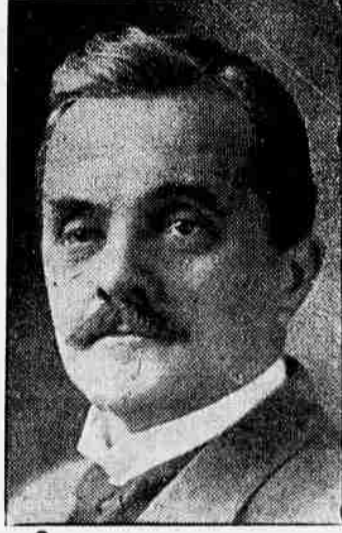

SHOOTING STARS PROMISED.
 First Display Nov. 15, Second Nov. 24—Northern Lights This Winter.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Oct. 11.—Two separate annual displays of shooting stars will be visible throughout Oregon November 15 and 24, according to E. H. McAllister, professor of astronomy and mechanics in the state university. The display due on November 15 may be seen in the early morning hours; that of November 24 is due in the early evening. The earth at these times will be cutting through the orbit of the swarm of meteors from which the stars come.
