## WOODMAN HAS REAL MESSAGE

LODGEMEN ENTHUSED BY THE SPEECH OF BROOKLYN MODERN WOODMAN OFFICIAL.

Audience Comparatively Small in Face of Counter Attractions During the Evening.

Due to many counter attractions only a comparatively small group of Modern Woodmen and Royal Neighbors were out last night to hear Edward F. Burns, of Brooklyn, who as national lecturer for the Modern Woodmen lodge, paid an official visit to the Woodmen of La Grande last night. His visit was far from fruitless, for the two score people who heard the distinguished lodgeman were so enthused that they are sure to spread the message the lecturer brought, to others of their number and to the public in general. Mr. Burns' reputation as an orator was ably sustained. He interspersed numerous stories of a witty and pertinent sort, but above all left the chief message he came to deliver—that Modern Woodmen, biggest of all fraternal insurance orders, was more than a beneficiary order—it was a fraternal order, too. Giving statistics to back his statements he pointed out the enormous death claims paid to widows since the order was founded 33 years ago. He pointed out how the La Grande camp itself has received more from the order in death benefits than it has paid in to the head offices.

He took particular pains to espouse the cause of the Colorado Springs sanatorium where Modern Woodmen afflicted with tuberculosis are sent and in a great many instances cured completely. About 2500 members have been treated and over 1500 cured who otherwise would have died from consumption.

He touched upon the needs of insurance, and cited that the man who was too poor to invest in old line insurance found it easy to protect his family via the Modern Woodmen route. He called attention to the fact that when the Titanic went down a great world-wide movement demanded adequate life boats and rafts for ocean steamers, "but" he said, "there are hundred of men in this state, hundreds of thousands in the United States who sail on life's ocean without adequate life insurance rafts, and should they suddenly strike icebergs

## WOOL THEME EXHAUSTED

EXTENSION PROFESSOR GOES INTO SUBJECT MOST THOROUGHLY TO CLASS.

Production, Manufacture and Uses of Wool Explained—Silk Discussed at Last Meeting Tonight.

Last night Prof. G. Robert McAuslan in his short course on salesmanship at the rooms of the Y. M. C. A. considered with his class the subject of wool and told some things about it not usually known. He first spoke of it historically and showed that since the first record in history sheep have always been the friend of man. He then, with a chart, showed the number of sheep in the world by continents and then spoke of the varieties of wool and the fact that all animals which have hair useful in spinning are classed as wool in the markets of the world. The best wools of the world he said come from Australia where land, food and climate make an ideal combination to raise sheep at little cost. Two and one quarter sheep being produced there at the same cost as here.

He said that the people of the United States yearly use between five and six pounds of wool for every man, woman and child in the country and that roughly speaking our half of the necessary amount has to be imported.

He then took up the importance of sorting as the pre-requisite for manufacturing and described the work in a mill, then in turn describing the various machines it passes through, the reason for them and how they work in making a wool yarn and that a somewhat more elaborate process was required to produce a worsted yarn. Tonight Prof. McAuslan will give his closing lecture on the subject of silk. This will be especially interesting as through the kindness of the Cheney Silk Co. of South Manchester, Conn., he is provided with samples of their work and fifty stereopticon slides showing the various processes of manufacture. To this lecture all are invited as it is provided by the University of Oregon extension department and is absolutely free.
