

EXPLORER, WAR SCRIBE, HERE

THREE IMPORTANT SERVICES TOMORROW FOR NOTED LEC- TURER FROM THE EAST.

Dr. Lincoln Wirt to Speak at the Y. M. C. A. in the Afternoon—Evening Address at M. E. Church.

Tomorrow will be an important day in La Grande pulpits. One of several features will be the appearance of Dr. Lincoln Wirt, explorer, lecturer, war correspondent, etc., who comes to the city for three addresses: One in the Methodist church in the morning, when he delivers a sermon, one at the Y. M. C. A. in the afternoon, and in the evening when he speaks on "In the Wake of the War."

The gallery of the church will be reserved in the evening for the high school delegation. In his lecture "In the Wake of the War" Dr. Wirt tells the story of his thrilling adventures as a war correspondent; of the day the Lusitania was torpedoed not far from his own ship; of his journeys over a large portion of Europe, and his life in the American Ambulance Corps. He vividly describes the construction of trenches, redoubts and barbed-wire entanglements; he tells of the engagements witnessed and the part played in them by machine guns, shrapnel bombs, hand grenades, mines, liquid fire and asphyxiating gases. You sit in the balcony of his Villa at Dunkirk while a military review is in progress; land forces are massed on the beach, naval forces are maneuvering off shore, and scores of air craft from monoplanes to dirigibles are scouting overhead.

All this and much more he tells of what he has seen and felt at the front, painting in the scenes as background against which he throws his deductions and arguments for International Disarmament—a movement in which he believes America should lead as a challenge of peace and good will to the world.

Dr. Wirt has only recently returned from Europe, and brings a fresh and vital message from eleven exhausted, bankrupt and war-sick peoples to the one great nation that still holds within it the world's hope of peace.

Loyal Lincoln Wirt is a native of Michigan. Most of his early life was spent on the Pacific Coast. He was sent, in 1897, to Alaska as Superintendent of Congregational Church work.

After three years in the Arctic, Dr. Wirt spent seven succeeding years in world-wide travel; journeying extensively throughout China, Japan, the Philippines, Australia, the South Sea Islands, Africa, Europe and Central America.

In speaking upon the subject Mr. Desilet said, "Yes, I realize the magnitude of the undertaking, but I have promised to make the business a success from the start, and I shall see that the entire stock is disposed of even if, in some cases, I am obliged to sell at sacrifice prices of a startling nature."
