IN MEMORIAM

(Edith Edna Breakenridge, Deceased.) In the Hawkeye state on December 18, 1885, there was born to Frank and Mattie Breakenridge a daughter whom they baptized Edith Edna. Early in her life the father died and the mother remarrying moved to the west and settled in the new state of Idaho. Capable and winsome in ability and character the girl grew to the womanhood with the fixed desire, the

product and effect of the atmosphere of that godly home, to be of service to the world. When having reached the age of nineteen she consulted with her pastor, the writer, as to the plan to pursue whereby she might become a deaconess; albeit the lack of sufficient money stood in her immediate way she prepared to teach in the public schools and thus earned her way to entrance to the Chicago Training School graduating in due course.

Her first work was as matron of the Deaconess Hospital at Great Falls, Montana. Afterward she felt the call of duty nearer home—her mother was long an invalid—and she went into Oregon where the mother had gone to reside, and took work there only to leave it later and devote her entire strength to that parent who so much needed her, her other daughters, except the youngest, having married.

In March 1916 her only brother, Wilbur, was cruelly and foully murdered; this blow so severe in itself to the whole family and the community, was exceptionally rigorous to the long bedridden mother and she followed her unfortunate son broken-hearted to the grave in a few weeks. Edna was her ubiquitous ministering angel, cheerful, inspiring, heaven-poised, and encouraging to the stricken mother while her own heart was all but crushed had it not been that the brother was an excellent and upright Christian man.

Giving and forgiving is the lot of the true woman. She gave and gave again until her physique had nothing more to contribute; then she sought the refuge of the hospital when too

late. The queenly woman, devoted affectionate friend, saintly servant of God and his children, and passionate lover of him who remains to weep, went away—to stay—September 26, 1916. For

A gem in casket white was laid In wedding garments dressed. Her flowers, her wedding ring, Her loved ones all, Stood there—a woeful company for him
