New York, October 16.—Eight hundred former U. S. Boy Scouts living on the west side of this city have formed an organization called the Junior Marine Scouts, for training in the duties of U. S. Marines. The organization is in no way affiliated with the U. S. Boy Scouts, and plans are under way to make the body national in scope and character.

Irrigation Men Witness Troop Games.

El Paso, Tex., Oct. 16.—(United Press).—Delegates to the twenty-third International Irrigation Congress today witnessed the special manoeuvres of the 60,000 regular troops and national guardsmen who have been mobilized here since early Summer.

Today these forces, the largest number of American soldiers ever gathered together in one place since the conclusion of the Civil War, began their weeks' program of war games and the working out of war problems on a large scale. Delegates and visitors thronged the streets and visited the camps of the soldiers.

Predicts Government Ownership of Roads.

Washington, Oct. 16.—(United Press)—Uncle Sam is going into the railroad business within the next decade, according to Benjamin C. Marsh, New York, executive secretary of the real preparedness committee of the Intercollegiate Socialist society, an organization backed morally and financially by Amos Pinchot. "Every railroad in the U.S.—252,000 miles of them," said Marsh today, "will pass from private ownership within ten years to be operated in the interest of the public instead of the interest of privilege. The railroad capitalists, being human wish to get wine prices for rain water. It is our mission to squeeze all the water out of the roads before the government takes them over." Declaring ultimate government operation of all roads, inevitable, Marsh said "the real problem is to see that the properties are not unloaded on the public at more than their actual value."

Woman Wants Accounting for Almost \$10,000 She Lent.

Chicago, Oct. 12.—Past benefits, it is alleged by his mother-in-law, were forgotten by Maurice Jacobs when recently he removed every piece of her furniture except a broken chair and the bed in which she lay ill.

The incident Mrs. Franciska Kauff relates in a bill she filed the other day asking that Jacobs be compelled to account to her for money she lent him and rents he has collected as her agent during her illness. She says she lent him almost \$10,000.

After the death of her daughter he became angered when she asked him to leave her home and took the furniture she averse.

JAPS PROTEST IS CONFIRMED.

Russians Too Object to Granting Railroad Concessions to Americans

Washington, Oct. 16.—(United Press)—The Chinese embassy has confirmed Pekin accounts of the Japanese and Russian governments protest against railway and canal rights concessions to the American International corporation of New York, and the Siems Carry company of St. Paul. Embassy officials refused to discuss the protests but it is believed they were laid before the state department.
