"Obey" May Be Dropped From Rites.

St. Louis, Oct. 17.—(Special)—The elimination of the word "obey" in the woman's promise in the marriage service was recommended in the minority report of the joint commission on common prayer submitted to the house of deputies of the Protestant Episcopal general conference. The house referred all proposed changes in the marriage service back to the commission on prayer book. The matter cannot come before the general convention again for three years.

The minority report recommended the present injunction beginning, "Wilt thou obey him and serve him?" be changed to "Wilt thou love him, comfort him, honor and keep him in sickness and in health; and forsaking all others keep thee unto him so long as ye shall live?"

GIRLS GOVERN THEMSELVES.
Reynolds Hall at Whitman College Adopts Student Government.

Whitman College, Walla Walla, Wash., Oct. 17.—Reynolds hall, one of the dormitories for girls, will be governed hereafter entirely by the girls themselves. All matters of conduct will come before a committee selected

by the girls. Each girl will be put on her honor to uphold the rules; and if infractions occur, they will be punished by the girls themselves and not by the Dean of Women as heretofore. Whitman is said to be the only American college where such a rule obtains. The new officers of the Association of Whitman Women which will have charge of this plan of self-government are: President, Mabel Gute, Spokane; vice president, Fay Hamm, Dayton; secretary, Lois Thompson, Sunnyside; treasurer, Naomi George, Walla Walla. Mamie Stelimon of Nez Perces, Idaho, has been elected House President of Reynolds hall, and Gertrude Barndt of Tuscola, Illinois, House President of Mores House. The class representatives on the executive committee are: Seniors, Lucille Kelling, Centralia; Juniors, Gertrude Upton of Spokane, and Sophomores, Alma Smith of Prescott.

DALLES POWER IS DESCRIBED
Several Electrochemical Industries Not Practicable; Main Hope Is in Nitrates And Phosphates

University of Oregon, Eugene, Oct. dustries has been made by O. F. Stafford, professor of chemistry in the University of Oregon, to determine what Dalles, Oregon, would be feasible in electro-chemical manufactures. Mr. Stafford's findings were recently printed in a technical magazine, and reprints have just arrived.

The survey covered the raw materials of power, fuels, limestone and lime, salt, silica, potash, and phosphate rock. The most available localities of each and the cost of getting each to The Dalles were described.

The electro-chemical industries that were then considered: abrasives, caustic and bleach, calcium carbide, chlorates, cyanides, graphite, phosphorus compounds, and nitrogen compounds.

The cost of production of each of these substances in imaginary plants at The Dalles, as compared with present costs of production elsewhere, together with a statement of transportation costs, was given.

The competition of the east seemed to Mr. Stafford for the present prohibitive in the following industries: Manufacture of abrasives (carborundum, crystalline aluminum, and others), of caustics and bleaches, except in a very limited way for a local market; of calcium carbide, except to a limited extent; of cyanides; and of artificial graphite, the sole raw material for which is said to be anthracite coal.

An electro-chemical manufacture which Mr. Stafford believes might be established under present conditions of materials, competition, transportation, and markets, is that of cyanimid, which may be used directly as a nitrogenous fertilizer constituent, or may be converted readily into ammon-

in, which in turn may be changed into ammonium sulphate, ammonium nitrate, ammonium sulphate, or any other desired ammonium compound.

Possibilities exist in the manufacture of chlorates.

"The utilization of atmospheric nitrogen for the production of ammonium nitrate is a possibility of the utmost importance for the future of the United States agriculturally, industrially, and for purposes of military defense," say the findings. "A power development for The Dalles could be utilized as soon as available for this industry."

"There is a more remote possibility affecting the great stores of phosphate rock in the northwest, which, contingently upon the successful outcome of experimental work actively under way and apparently showing indications of success, may be transformed into ammonium phosphate by the help of electrical power, and by this means become available for the uses of agriculture the world over.

Beyond possible uses in manufacture of nitrates and phosphates, Mr. Stafford estimates 25,000 as the pro-

bable maximum of horse power that could be profitably used at The Dalles under present conditions, in electro-chemical industries.

"To dam the Columbia for power purposes would be almost as costly an undertaking for 25,000 horse power as for 250,000 of even perhaps 500,000," said Mr. Stafford. "It does not electro-chemical industries would be practicable without establishment also if the greater ones for the manufacture of nitrates and phosphates."
