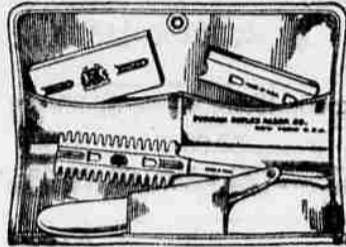

BEEF SUPPLY UNUSUALLY BIG

Portland Stock Yards, Oct. 17.—(Special)—North Portland is being flooded with cattle. The run to date this month is 700 head, and there are for the greatest run ever shown here since the Portland Union stockyards was established.

Steady tone was generally shown in the mutton and lamb trade at North Portland for the initial transactions for the week. There was a fair run reported in the yards over Sunday, and general sentiment was about the same as for recent weeks.

With a very liberal run of swine in the yards over Sunday, much weakness was shown in the North Portland market at the start of the week's trading. A total of 2669 head appeared over Sunday, compared with 2259 last week and 3332 head this same day a year ago.

Northern Pacific Pays \$133.28 a Minute to Operate Road.

St. Paul, Minn., Oct. 17.—It costs \$133.28 a minute to operate the Northern Pacific railroad. These figures were given out today by the railroad. The cost of operating the roads 6,000 miles of track is \$148,780 daily, but this does not include the \$19,797 daily spent for permanent improvements. Annually, the roads spends \$7,225,905 for betterments.
