SECOND STRING BOOKS GAMES

Will Play Baker Second Team Here

Nov. 4. and There on November 25. Eighteen Compose Squad.

La Grande's High School second squad, composed of 18 men, has closed arrangements for a game with Baker's second team at La Grande November 4th, and at Baker November 25. These 18 men are not only getting in splendid practice for themselves but are giving the first string men some fine practice every night.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Oct. 18.—A football team that is almost entirely Oregon-bred and Oregon-raised leaves tonight to meet the California-bred and California-raised men of the University of California. The game will be played in the Berkeley stadium on the afternoon of October 21, and will be the first test of football strength in many years between Oregon and California. The one university outnumbers the other in attendance about ten to one, yet such is the training, the determination, and the quality of the fine Oregon squad that the giant of the south is believed to have small advantage. "After all, only eleven men can meet eleven of ours at once," said Hugo Bezdek.

Coach Bezdek will take eighteen men. They will average, stripped, 180 pounds. They will represent 15 towns, of which 11 are Oregon towns. They will be:

- Dudley, Athena, Or., sub-lineman.
- Williams, Eugene, Or., sub-lineman.
- McKinney, Olympia, Wash., sub-end.
- Nelson, Hollister, Idaho, sub-end.
- Tuerck, Portland, sub-backfield.
- Couch, Island City, Or., sub-backfield.
- Jensen, Junction, Or., sub-backfield.

The team will be back in time for 8 o'clock lectures, Monday morning, October 23. The game will be the first of the year in the new Pacific Coast Intercollegiate Conference, formed at Portland last December, with membership of University of California, University of Oregon, University of Washington, and Oregon State Agricultural College. Stanford University has been invited to join, but has not yet abandoned rugby.

New York, Oct. 18.—(United Press Staff Correspondent.)—When Harvard and Yale clash Nov. 25 in their annual big football game, the Harvard coaches may surprise followers of the game by the method of play they adopt for the encounter.

After years of adherence to trick formations and smashing attack, and concentration upon kickers the Harvard team has been trying out the open game this year. The coaches have been laying more stress upon hid-which, in the last few years, have been rather side-tracked in favor of straight football.

The conservative style of football, which has been Harvard's since Percy Haughton took charge of the team, is not favored so greatly by assistant coaches who have had much to do with the building of the team this year and the open formations probably will get their share of attention in the big game. They probably have not been given the full sanction of the famous coach but he doubtless will give a large bit of attention to the open style.

New formations both in attack and defense, have been used with success by both varsity and scrub teams in practice.

The almost entirely new material from which the backfield was built this year had made necessary some changes. Flower and Casey, stars last year on the Freshman Eleven, are men around whom the basis of trick plays probably will be formed. The newer men have had much schooling in scholastic years in open formations and they yield easier to that kind of instruction.

Yale's failure to make a success of the wide-open style of attack has not deterred Harvard's under coaches from pressing that style of play.

Buenos Aires, Oct. 18.—(United Press.)—So many unkind things have been said in Buenos Aires concerning the tameness of the recent Langford-McVey fight that the promoters have issued an explanation which declares that:

"To those who wish to see a drainpipe around the ring to catch the blood, and an audience waiting at the front door of the club to bring the

boxers to the morgue, I can only say that they were disappointed, but the days of this kind of pleasure have long since passed in the grand old game of boxing."

Fans who saw the fight say they do not believe that Langford and McVey will be bothered the next time they meet in Buenos Aires by spectators who want to "see a drainpipe around the ring to catch the blood," or any other kind of spectators.

How to Eradicate Bedbugs.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 18.—Those who are troubled by bedbugs will find practical information as to how to deal effectively with these pests in Farmers' Bulletin 754, "Bedbugs," recently published by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. In this bulletin C. L. Marlatt of the Bureau of Entomology makes clear the habits of these insects which have a bearing on their eradication, and suggests a number of simple household measures, as well as more radical methods, of getting rid of them. The author calls attention especially to the fact that these insects will migrate from an unoccupied to an inhabited house and points out the fact that they ordinarily hide in the daytime makes it necessary to apply the insecticides in cracks in walls and floor and crevices under wall paper, where the insects ordinarily are concealed and lay their eggs. Information as to the ability of bedbugs to withstand cold to go without food for long periods should be especially useful to those intending to move into houses long untenanted.

Of the simpler remedies the entomologist says that benzene, kerosene, or other lighter petroleum oils introduced into crevices by means of a brush or syringe are perhaps the most efficient. The bulletin also gives directions for fumigation with sulphur or other chemicals, which will be found economical and effective in cases of general infestation.

Those who have been bitten will find applications of peroxide of hydrogen useful in allaying irritation. Tincture of iodine, in its ordinary double strength, is also a very good counter-irritant for use in cases of fleas, mosquitoes, bedbugs, or other insect bites. Iodine, however, should be used with caution on the tender skin of small children and on those who are affected with or disposed to eczemic disorders.

ASHLAND PRESIDENT FAVORS PENDLETON

NEED OF EASTERN OREGON SCHOOL FULLY SHOWN BY B. F. MULKEY, FORMER HEAD OF ASHLAND SCHOOL.

Portland, Ore.—The Honorable B. F. Mulkey, ex-President of the Southern Oregon Normal School at Ashland, says, concerning the establishment of an additional Normal School at Pendleton: "I shall support the measure heartily for the reason that the present Normal School, though one of the best in the country, cannot be adequate to meet the needs of so large a state as Oregon. There is no institution that touches the masses of the people so closely as does the Normal School and the benefit derived from the taxes paid by the people of the state for the maintenance of such schools returns directly to the man and woman who paid the taxes and is conferred directly upon them and their children. The expense of maintaining a good Normal School in Eastern Oregon to a taxpayer on an assessed valuation of \$4000.00 would each year be under the cost of a good Havana cigar. I sincerely hope that the coming election will grant to the people of Eastern Oregon the relief they seek in a Normal School."

CRISIS WARNING IS GIVEN

Representative Hawley Delivers Address At Brownsville.
Brownsville, Ore., Oct. 18.—(Special.)—Representative W. C. Hawley spoke here Sunday night under the auspices of the National Hughes Alliance to an audience of about 250.

He was introduced by Ira Hittner, and in the course of his speech he said that never before had there existed such a crisis and that never before had so much depended on how the vote was cast.

He said the country would be flooded with foreign goods after the war and urged a protective tariff.

He made the assertion that the present prosperity was caused by the war, and that if Wilson was elected he would veto any change in tariff. He also predicted soup houses all over the country if Wilson is elected. He said people were hoarding their profits and refusing to invest in worthless property.

He accused the Democrats of extravagance and broken platform pledges. He also denounced Wilson's Mexican policy, saying that if Republicans were elected they would adopt Taft's Mexican policy. At the close of his speech he made an appeal for the election of Hughes and received considerable applause.

Mr. Hawley intended to speak at the County Fair, but arrived too late.
