MUCH GRAIN DISPOSED OF

A grain transaction involving \$55,000 took place at the Union Flouring Mill Co.'s mill in this city last week when 37,500 bushels of wheat and 4,806 cwt. of barley, belonging to several Sandridge farmers was sold to the local mill company, relates the Union Scout. The price said to be paid was \$1.25 a bushel for wheat and \$1.76 per cwt. for barley. The price received was the best for as large holdings this season, and the deal represents the largest cash transaction made by the local mill this season.

The grain sold last week represents a portion of this season's crop raised on the Frank Conley land in the Sandridge district. This is not near all the grain which has been taken in by the local mill from the Conley place however. The men who sold their grain last week were: Ray and Lon Eyres, Henry Lovan, Geo. and Al Puckett and a portion of the grain from W. T. and Frank Conley's. The men are all renters of the Conley lands on the Sandridge. The grain sold included 2,235,016 pounds of wheat and 480,560 pounds of barley or about 37,250 bushels of wheat and 4,806 cwt. of barley. The total price received for the wheat was about \$46,500 and the total price for the barley was about \$8,500.

The grain from the Sandridge section is usually divided about equally between the Island City mill and the local mill so that about half of the Conley grain will be sold at the Island City mill, although there is still a great deal of it here which has not been sold yet and more is coming in every day.

The heaviest of the grain however is in the local warehouses although there are still several carloads coming in each day. The final windup will be in the next week or so however.

President Ed Kiddle of the Union Flouring Mills Co. was in town from his home at Island City, Thursday, to help write the checks for the grain deal.

65 SCHOOLS IN DEBATE LEAGUE

Sixty-five Oregon high schools have now become members of this year's Oregon High School Debating League. Last year's membership was fifty-one. The membership has doubled in three years.

The subject for debate this winter was announced last Saturday. It is: "Resolved that Oregon should adopt a health insurance law embodying the essential features of the 'Standard Bill' of the American Association for Labor Legislation."

Health insurance was chosen because of increasing public interest in it, because of the newness of the proposal in the west, and because it is expected to become an issue in Oregon within a year.

NAVY GETS SIX FLIERS

Machines Are To Be Used To Train
Aviators For Scouting

Marblehead, Mass., Oct. 17.—Six new school machines for the United States Navy have been accepted by the department, and shipments will begin at once by the Burgess Company, it was announced. The new aeroplanes are tractors; the first ever used by the Navy in this country, and are designed primarily for the training of additional Navy fliers.

The six school aircraft will be shipped to Pensacola, while the other two will probably be taken aboard by the North Carolina, the Naval mother ship.

The six aircraft are designed for a speed of between 60 and 65 miles an hour and a climb of 200 feet a minute with full load aboard, comprising pilot and passenger and fuel and supplies for a flight of four hours. The power plant consists of an engine of 120 horsepower, while the radiator, mounted in front of the body, is stream lined to cut down head resistance to a minimum.
