FORTY-CENT JUMP BY HOME BRANDS OF FLOUR ONE OF MARKET ITEMS.
Sugar Is Higher and Foreign Brands of Flour Are Up—Bluestem Hugs \$2.00 Mark.

And still the cost of living soars. Sugar, home and other brands of flour; this, that and the other thing is skyrocketing. This morning home brands of flour shot up 40 cents a barrel at one jump, which means 10 cents a sack. Sugar has gone up and scarcely an absolute food necessity that has not skyrocketed during the past two weeks, and it seems not in sight even yet.

Illinois Suffragists in Convention
Springfield, Ill., October, 19.—(Bu United Press)—To expedite the establishment of full suffrage for the already partially-enfranchised women of Illinois, delegates representing more than two hundred affiliated organizations met in the chambers of the Capital here today attending the forty eighth annual convention of the Illinois Equal Suffrage association. Plans for the campaign to get results from the premises included in every national platform for the furtherance of suffrage, were being made today.

To Keep Out of War.

Street car advertising is being resorted to in Oregon, and in the hope of influencing the votes of women cards have been printed bearing that fallacious assertion of Democrats who laugh at its undeniable mendacity even while they utter it, "Wilson kept us out of war."
Never, in all of its history, was the United States in less danger of getting into war than it has been during the administration of President Wilson. In the second place he has got us into more trouble than we have ever been in since the war with Spain, and more American lives have been sacrificed in Mexico than were killed by the Spaniards.

With the continuous and persistent repetition of this fallacious utterance, "He kept us out of war," it is necessary to reiterate the facts, even if the Democratic press continues to howl about Republican criticism of the president.
To say that we have been kept out of war with any European nation is amusing. Nothing we could have done would have caused any of them to have taken on more trouble

than they already had. Even an embargo on munitions of war, which would have virtually allied us with the Teutons, must have passed unnoticed. The seizure of the interned German ships would have been at most a case for an arbitration court.
As for Mexico, the acts of this administration would have plunged us head over heels into war had Mexico been a nation of any power or military strength and not a weak sister, split into half a dozen factions by civil strife.
Blood of American soldiers stains the soil in Mexico. Twice have we invaded that land, and each time the result has not been to our honor, but to our shame.
Mr. Wilson made war upon Huerta, captured Vera Cruz, killed a hundred Mexicans and 19 brave American marines lost their lives. For what? To get a salute for the American flag. Did we get it? We did not. And after the shipload of ammunition, which we should have seized and didn't, had been landed at another port and delivered to Huerta, Mr. Wilson changed his mind and backed out of Mexico.

The Carranza affair is too fresh in our minds to need recalling. So little respect did Carranza, the man whom we recognized and befriended, have for this country that it was necessary to mobilize our entire army and the biggest part of the militia at a cost of \$130,000,000, before he would believe we were not too proud to fight.
Here is what Mr. Hughes has said about the Wilson Mexico policy:
"Weakness breeds insult. Insult breeds war. Honest, firm, consistent, determined defense of rights establishes peace and respect throughout the world."
That's the way to keep out of war, and that's the kind of a man the people of the United States want for president.
