culturist has proven himself industrious and efficient and, whereas, because of the time necessary for a man to get acquainted with the field, a change is detrimental to the agricultural interests of the county. Be it hereby resolved that we petition our county court to maintain our present county agriculturist as long as he proves efficient, and avoid future changes if possible.

Resolution No. 4.
Whereas, for some time there has been considerable talk of changing to the bulk system of handling grain.

Be it hereby resolved that we go on record as favoring this change as soon as possible.

Other Resolutions.
Also in regard to the following amendments or measures to be submitted to the voters of Oregon at the general election Nov. 7th, 1916.

First, we go on record as opposing Amendment No. 303, The Ship Tax Exemption Amendment.

Second, we are favoring Amendment No. 304, The Negro and Mulatto Suffrage Amendment.

Third, we are not in favor of Amendment 309, The Election of a State Normal School in Pendleton, Oregon.

Fourth, we also go on record as opposing Amendment No. 315 which is Permitting Manufacture and Regulated Sale Four Per Cent Malt Liquors.

Fifth, we favor Amendment No. 316.

Sixth, we favor Amendment No. 318, The Rural Credit Bill.

Seventh, we also favor Amendment No. 320.

PROCLAMATION URGES RELIEF

President Wilson's interest in Armenian relief days which will be celebrated throughout the country tomorrow and Saturday, is indicated to be keen by the following proclamation issued by him to assist liberal giving for the relief of Armenians:

Whereas I have received from the Senate of the United States a Resolution, passed July 7 (calendar day, July 10), reading as follows:

"Resolved, that, appreciating the sufferings of the Syrian people, it is suggested that the President of the United States set aside a day upon which a direct appeal to the sympathy of all American citizens shall be made and an opportunity shall be given for our public-spirited people to contribute to a much-needed fund for relief of the Syrian people."

And Whereas, a Resolution was passed by the Congress of the United States on July 18, 1916, reading as follows:

Resolved by the Senate (the House of Representatives concurring), That, in view of the misery, wretchedness and hardships, which these people are suffering, the President of the United States be respectfully asked to designate a day on which the citizens of this country may give expression to their sympathy by contributing to the funds now being raised for the relief of the Armenian in the belligerent countries."

And Whereas, I feel confident that the people of the United States will be moved to aid these peoples stricken by war, famine and disease;

Now, therefore, I, Woodrow Wilson, President of the United States, in compliance with the said suggestion of the Senate, and the said request of Congress thereof; do appoint and proclaim Saturday, October 21, and Sunday, October 22, 1916, as joint days upon which the people of the United States may make such contributions as they feel disposed for the aid of the stricken Syrian and Armenian peoples.

In Witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the City of Washington this thirty-first day of August, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and sixteen, and of the Independence of the United States the one hundred and forty-first.

CHARLES M. MILLER IS DEAD.

Man Who Helped Strike Famous O.-W. Artesian Well Passes.

Letters from Spokane to Roscoe West of this city tell of the untimely death of Chas. M. Miller, aged 29, who for eight years was a partner with Mr. West and who helped strike the big artesian well in the O.-W. yards a number of years ago. Another distressing feature of the demise is that he leaves a bride of exactly four months. Mr. Miller, who was a man of unusual size and robustness, weighed 247 pounds. He was seized with appendicitis and though he withstood the ordeal at the time, a weak heart brought on death in a Spokane hospital 48 hours after the operation. He died October 9th the letter to Mr. West states.

London, Oct. 14.—(Special).—A Reuters dispatch from Athens says: "Admiral Du Fumet, commanding the Anglo-French fleet, addressed a complimentary note to the Greek government demanding control of the Greek police, prohibition of Greek citizens from carrying arms, stoppage of sending war munitions to Thessaly and lifting the embargo on transportation of Thessalian wheat."

German Potato Harvest Short.

Amsterdam, Oct. 19.—(Special).—The Kolnische Volks Zeitung says that

President Von Batocki of the food regulation board has admitted to Reichstag that Germany's potato harvest is disappointing as the result of the lack of seed potatoes left over from last year. The authorities are considering the steps deemed necessary. Meanwhile all trade in seed potatoes is forbidden.

Potato Bread Recommended
Washington, D. C., Oct. 19.—(Special).—The department of agriculture recommends more general use of potatoes in making bread. It is found that bread containing boiled and mashed potatoes is as nutritious as wheat bread and remains fresh longer. Government experts baked excellent bread with three pounds of potatoes and 2½ pounds of flour. The recipes are formulated.
