Medical Association Selects Pendleton as Next Meeting Place—Clinic in Hospital Interests.

Concerning the Medical Association held at Baker the Democrat says:

At a business session which opened in the afternoon, D. J. L. Boyden of Pendleton was elected president, Dr. R. E. L. Holt of La Grande, first vice president; Dr. J. P. Meyers of Union, second vice president, and Dr. Thomas J. Higgins of Baker, secretary-treasurer.

The society voted to hold the next annual meeting at Pendleton, no other city contesting the honor.

Dr. W. D. McNary, superintendent of the Pendleton insane asylum, and Dr. S. C. Standard of Huntington were named as delegates to represent the society at the annual meeting of the State Medical society in Portland next year.

W. M. Emery of Union, Dr. H. T. Ellison of Heppner, Dr. J. M. Waugh of Hood River and Dr. H. H. Haddery of Pendleton were accepted as new members when their applications were voted on.

J. P. Meyers of Union, Harry Bouvey of La Grande and R. E. L. Holt of La Grande were named as members of the board of censors for the ensuing year, and a special committee consisting of W. L. Parker of Baker, R. E. Ringo of Pendleton and S. C. Standard of Huntington was named to convey the condolences of the society to the family of Dr. L. R. Bryan of Union, who passed away since the last annual meeting.

Law, North Powder; A. C. McCown, Cove; J. M. Waugh, Hood River; J. Griswold, Helix; G. L. Boyden, Pendleton; C. F. Elkenbury, Spokane; Harry Bouvey, La Grande.

The morning session was not carried out according to the program, for the reason that more time was taken up with the clinic at St. Elizabeth hospital than anticipated, three operations being performed, two by Dr. Higgins and one by Dr. Blakely. The visiting doctors also spent some time inspecting the hospital, which they praised lavishly as one of the best equipped and conducted hospitals in the state, bestowing like meed of praise on the Sisters of St. Francis, citizens of Baker and local physicians and surgeons whose efforts made the completion of the institution possible. The work at the hospital occupied the entire forenoon, after which the visitors were taken for an auto ride about the city by the local members.

After lunch, the business meeting was called to order at 1 o'clock sharp by President Dr. C. M. Pearce, the business of the society being disposed of as noted above, after which the program was carried out.

During the program little discussion was on anything except the subject at hand and no matters of special interest to the general public taken up, but from a professional standpoint all present agreed that the papers read were highly instructive and that the discussions helped to enlighten the listeners on numerous important points, that the program was an excellent one in every detail and that the session as a whole was highly successful and one of the best in the history of the society.
