IMPORTANT TRANSACTIONS
MARK PROGRESS OF W. C. T. U. CONCLAVE.

Mrs. Thornton of La Grande on This Morning's Program—Election of Officers Held Yesterday Afternoon.

Pendleton, Oct. 20.—(Special)—The state W. C. T. U. convention now in progress here is proving one of the best held in several years.

Among the persons taking prominent parts in the program is Mrs. Para Thornton, president of the Union County W. C. T. U. She first was heard Wednesday morning when she reported for Union county officially and took part in discussion during the late afternoon.

A group of Indians, much interested in temperance, sang yesterday in their own jargon to the ladies. Mrs. Jennie M. Kemp of Portland was this afternoon re-elected president of the W. C. T. U. of Oregon in tribute to the great service she has rendered the institution during her incumbency.

Mrs. Ward Swope of Portland was elected vice-president at large, Mrs. Mary D. Russell of Portland was re-elected corresponding secretary, Mrs. Madge Mears of Sheed was re-elected recording secretary and Mrs. Margaret Houston of Portland was re-elected treasurer.

Though the election was scheduled for Thursday morning it was postponed until 1 yesterday afternoon. Two ballots were taken on each office, the first being an informal and nominating ballot. For president quite a number of ladies were nominated but on the second ballot there was only one contender for the honor besides Mrs. Kemp.

Mrs. Henrietta Brown of Albany has been vice-president at large but illness prevented her attendance at the convention and led to her declining to serve further.

A great part of the Friday morning session was taken up with the reports of various department workers. One of the important actions taken this morning was the retention of the old list of salaries for officers. There had been some sentiment for a reduction but the majority took the stand that the "laborer is worth his hire."

The banquet, served in the basement of the Methodist church, was largely attended Wednesday evening. It was presided over very graciously by Mrs. G. W. Rugg. Speeches of welcome were made by Major J. A. Best, representing the city; Judge S. A. Lowell, representing the Commercial association; Supt. A. T. Park for the schools, Mrs. E. T. Wade for the Civic club, Mrs. W. D. McNary for the Parent-Teachers' association; Rev. J. E. Snyder for the churches and Mrs. S. A. Lowell for the local W. C. T. U.

Some Abbreviations.

Viz. oz., cwt., dwt., gr., a/c. Do you know why we write these everyday signs and what their origins are? Viz. is derived from the first two letters of the Latin word "videlicet," meaning "namely."

In course of time this sign became z. The same applies to oz., our abbreviation for ounce.

The letters lb., standing for pounds in weight, are the first and third letters of the Latin word "librae." Cwt. (hundredweight) and dwt. (pennyweight) are also abbreviations of Latin words.

A/c stands for "account current," the stroke only being put to separate the letters. The gr stands for "ad," the Latin word for "at" or "to."

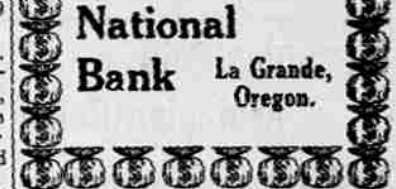

ADAMSON LAW CRITICISED

Complaint Comes From Non-Partisan Ranks of Workers Numbering 16,000 Members.

Chicago, Oct. 20.—The Railway Workers Non-Partisan association, which is said to have 16,000 members, today announced its opposition to the Adamson eight hour law. Through its national chairman, W. J. Pinkerton of Chicago, the association addressed a circular letter to W. G. Lee, president of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, in which the Adamson eight hour law is described as "the death knell of the economic organizations, the railroad brotherhoods," and a demand made that the measure be repealed and a convention called to make an investigation of the facts.

Four years ago, the organization made a successful fight against the Bradley Compensation law which was opposed by the organizations of rail-

way employes. "Congress must have known that a crime was being perpetrated against Democratic traditions," the letter said, "when it forced a law on 400,000 citizens without giving them an opportunity to discuss the merits of such radical legislation as applied to working agreements."

"I say that our representatives in accepting the Adamson eight hour law from congress traded certainty for uncertainty for uncertainty—a law that may take from the workmen even that which they now have."
