LIBRARY HERE IS A DEPOSITORY

"State Depository libraries are such public or normal school libraries as may be designated by the trustees of the State library. Such designation entitles them to one set each of reports of State officers, boards, commissions, and institutions, and to one set of bound State documents." From Oregon Blue Book.

Among such depository libraries are those of Baker, Pendleton and La Grande.

A recent shipment to the La Grande Public library contains two bulletins on fire prevention, and also a publication issued by the Industrial welfare commission, entitled "A Living Wage by Legislation," by Edwin V. O'Hara.

The Industrial accident commission has issued a summary of the state workmen's compensation law. This bulletin is intended for general distribution, and any number of copies may be obtained through the public library, from the Commission. The object of the bulletin, as stated therein, is "to furnish workmen who are subject to the Oregon Workmen's Compensation law with information relative to its benefits."

Big Sums Paid Armenian Relief

One Man Alone Gives Nearly \$50,000—The campaign conducted in La Grande today by various organizations.

New York, Oct. 20.—(Special)—A caller today at the office of the American Committee for Armenian and Syrian Relief, Seventy-fifth avenue, handed Charles R. Crane, the treasurer, a check for \$25,000 on condition that his name should never be associated with this contribution. This

same gentleman a few weeks ago left another check for \$18,000 under the same conditions.

This is the largest anonymous gift, but by no means the only one, received by the committee. Another such contributor has given more in the aggregate than this donor of the \$25,000 and \$18,000 checks. He has sent a check for \$5,000 the first day of every month for the past twelve months. His name is not found anywhere in the records of the committee. A total of over \$100,000 has been given by men and women similarly modest.

Marshfield, Ore., Oct. 20.—(Special)—Joseph Coach shot and killed G. C. Treadgold an attorney of Bandon, in a public garage at Coquille last night. Coach then shot himself through the head and will probably die. As Treadgold entered the garage Coach shot him without a word.

Coach several years ago inherited a considerable fortune from his father,

er, a wealthy timberman. With part of his money he entered the saloon business two years ago and Treadgold prosecuted him for selling liquor to minors. Mrs. Coach filed a divorce suit yesterday. Coach told friends that Treadgold was her attorney, although this was incorrect.

LEE MONUMENT DEDICATED

Virginians Erect Handsome Tribute to Confederate Commander.

Gettysburg, Pa., Oct. 20.—(United Press)—The much discussed monument to General Robert E. Lee, commander of the Confederate forces at the Battle of Gettysburg, was dedicated on Gettysburg field here recently. The monument stands in west Confederate avenue, close to the Round Tops and is a tribute to a son of Virginia. Many prominent men and women from both North and South were present for the dedication.

La Grande Visitor Dead.

Last Saturday Mrs. Towne of Washington state, whose home is near Yakima, returned to her home after a visit with her daughter, Mrs. J. C. Gharst at the Palmer Mill boarding house.
