Cove's Prune Harvest.

Cove, Oct. 23.—(Special)—The prune harvest in Cove is about complete. For three weeks past a large force of people have been engaged picking and packing for the different shippers. About 28 car loads will be the total amount to go out from here this season. Six cars have been shipped by Carl Stackland, six by Albert Conklin, and John Dean will get out about 15. The early fall frost damaged the prunes slightly but most of them proved good for the markets. John Dean, who is now the largest prune grower and shipper in this section of the valley, says this has been the banner year for prune growing
