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JEWEL HONORS GIVEN JURIST

CIRCUIT JUDGE DECORATED IN FORM WITH BADGE OF LONG SERVICE.

Brief Program, Luncheon and Toasts
Ring With Witticism and Sattire—
Recipient Accepts Eloquently.

With deeply impressive ceremonial, Red Cross Lodge No. 27 last evening decorated Circuit Judge J. W. Knowles with the veteran's jewel—significant of a quarter century continuous membership in Red Cross. More than a half hundred Knights were assembled, and were entertained, first, in an informal way, then witnessed the presentation, later partook of light refreshments and then listened to an after-dinner speech program.

At the outset O. R. Stageberg entertained with a vocal solo; Harley Richardson with a trio of readings, and M. A. Faulk with some harmonica selections. Then Postmaster E. E. Bragg delivered the presentation speech, paying well-deserved tribute to the character and life of the beneficiary of the jewel. Graciously accepting the jewel, Judge Knowles eloquently traced the origin of the order, re-told the story of Damon and Pythias, and spoke of the subsequent organization of the order. Then Past Supreme Representative Turner Oliver and the judge formed the head of the procession to the dining tables, followed by past grand lodge representatives, past chancellor commanders, visiting brothers and members of Red Cross.

Before the honor guest's plate lay a fancy cake bedecked in the colors of the lodge, and itself inscribed with the initials of the order. The artistic contraption of pastry and colors was conceived by the proprietor of the Hull bakery, himself a Knight. The supervision of speeches was

made by R. J. Green, and he called upon Andrew Marker first. Mr. Marker is an esquire in the order, and delivered a satire that, in beauty of construction, flow of words and depth of its ironical stings stood out as the feature of a brilliant flow of witticism during the evening. He was followed by Rodney J. Kitchen of Union who spoke briefly. Rev. Chas. A. Edwards of the Methodist church then spoke eloquently, and he in turn was followed by Bruce Dennis who likewise kept up the constant flow of wit and humor. Rev. G. L. Clark of the Presbyterian church was heard briefly in his inimitable way as were H. E. Dixon, Kenneth McCormick, Walter Reuter, Turner Oliver, Past Supreme Representative Marian Davis of Union—who was unavoidably delayed and didn't arrive until a late hour—and various others as well.

In many respects it was one of the most delightful functions Red Cross has staged in years.

LODGE WOMEN AWAIT ORACLE

PREPARATION TO ENTERTAIN 225 AT DINNER AND SUPPER HAVE BEEN MADE BY COMMITTEES.

All Sessions Save Evening One Closed—Public Will See Drills and Hear Speech.

Yesterday afternoon, and again today, elaborate plans were shaped by members of the Royal Neighbors in La Grande in their campaign to entertain, tomorrow, the highest official in their order. Myra B. Enright, supreme oracle, of Kansas, will pay an official visit to La Grande tomorrow morning, afternoon and evening, and because she makes but one stop in Eastern Oregon, a half dozen important lodges are coming to La Grande to greet her. Baker, Pendleton, Halfway, Rock Creek, Hermiston and several other lodges in the big outdoors of the Eastern half of the state, will arrive tomorrow morning, while the Elgin and branch line delegates generally come this evening. ODD CONDITION POSSIBLE

Confusion Over U'Ren Bill Would Lead to Peculiar Situation.

Should the confusion now existing in the minds of many voters between the Single Tax and the Rural Credits measures result in the adoption of the U'Ren bill at the coming election, a peculiar condition will result. Attorneys declare the Single Tax bill, which appears on the ballot under the name of "Full Rental Value Land Tax and Homesteaders' Loan Fund Amendment," can never withstand the scrutiny of the courts and that it will be declared unconstitutional.

But it is evident that buyers of land will await the decision of the court before investing one dollar in real estate in Oregon. That hesitancy will be apparent as soon as the newspapers carry the news that the U'Ren amendment to the state constitution has been adopted by the people. Weeks and possibly months will elapse before the dangers of commercial revolution such as the provisions of this measure will bring have passed. In the meantime much development work in Oregon must stand still.

The Single Tax bill is the first initiative measures on the ballot. Its voting numbers are 306 yes and 307 no. The Rural Credits is the seventh initiative measure.

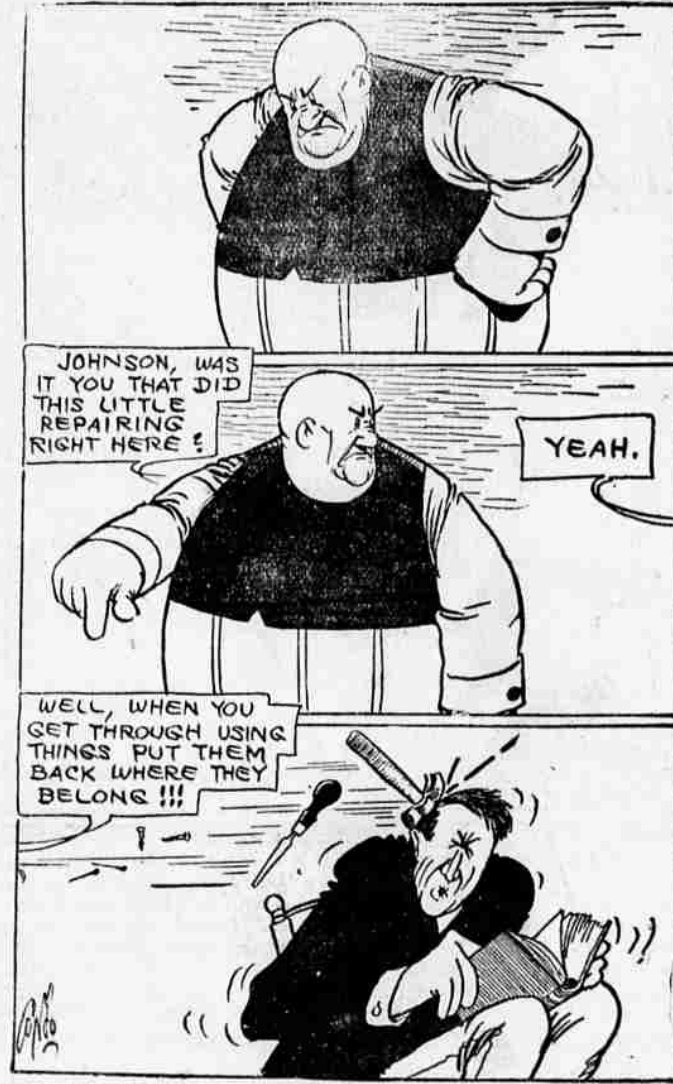
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OUTBURSTS OF EVERETT TRUE—BY CONDO
