EPISCOPALEANS TABOO DRINKS

Resolution Opposes Wines at Banquets or Gatherings.

St. Louis, Oct. 25.—(United Press)—The Episcopal House of Deputies today passed a resolution asking all church members to not use intoxicating liquors at public banquets or gatherings. The House of Bishops considers the resolution this afternoon. Delegates declared it is not a prohibition move; merely asking for home temperance.

CALLS ADAMSON LAW GOLD BRICK.

Willcox Declares Measure Will Do Much to Defeat President.

Washington, Oct. 25.—Republican Chairman Willcox mailed a statement to Washington newspaper correspondents yesterday saying: "The Wilson-Adamson wage increase bill will do more than anything else to defeat the president's ambition to succeed himself. Wilson succeeded in handing a gold brick to the presidents of the railway brotherhoods. He cannot deceive the men they represent once they get a chance to examine the bills themselves."

He declared the Adamson law makes every railroad employe subject to injunction, a fine of a thousand dollars and a year's imprisonment for interfering in interstate traffic. He said the fact that President Lovett of the Union Pacific and the president of the Erie had determined to support Willcox, should cause suspicion.

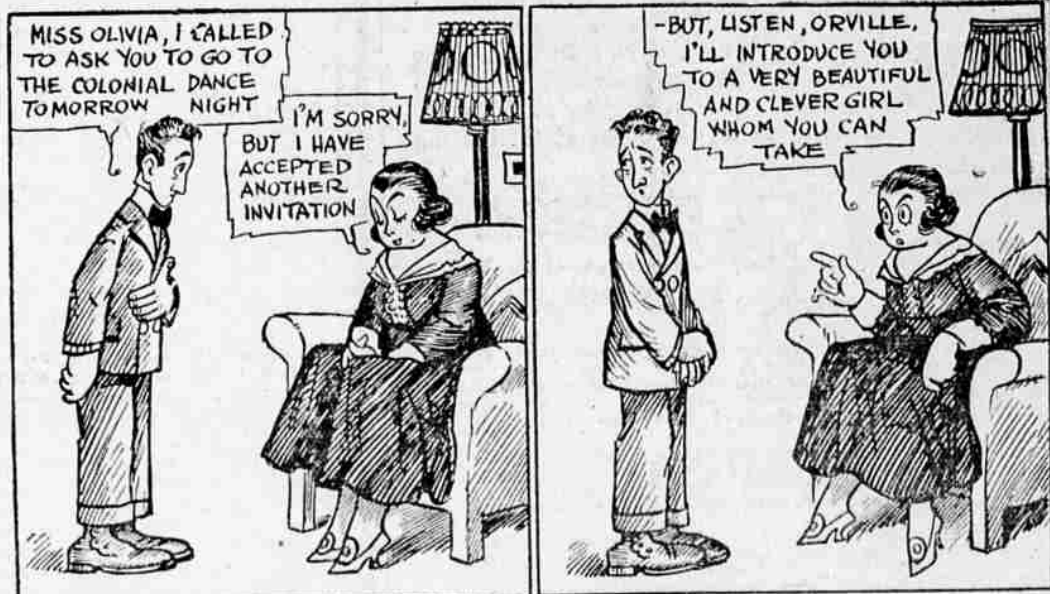
