NEW BOOKS AT LIBRARY

"When they came over the Blue mountains and into the Grande Ronde—the Great Circle, as the French-Canadians had called it, because it was a large and round valley—travelers had a hard time with their wagons. The mountain sides were so steep they had to tie a rope to the hind wheels of each wagon in going down. This rope they twisted around a tree, so that as it was paid out the heavy wagon moved slowly and could not so easily upset. Ropes used in this way cut a screw-like curve in the trees, and these may be seen even to this day. Even the pack horses had a hard time on the steep trails, setting their feet close together sometimes and sliding down. Every now and then someone had to stop to mend a broken axle or a broken harness. So the immigrants crawled up the steep mountain sides and almost crashed down them, fording rivers even where the current was quite swift and the water deep, until they were safely past the Grande Ronde."

The above is quoted from "Early Days in Old Oregon," by Katherine B. Judson, a copy of which has just been received at the La Grande Public Library. Although written especially for children, the book will appeal to anyone interested in the romantic history of Oregon. Miss Judson has given years of study to

the subject, having had access to the documents of the Public Record Office in London, and to the journals, diaries, and letters of the Hudson Bay Co.

Speaking of available books and literature material Miss Haley said today:

"Any document requested from the Public Library will be obtained either by purchase, or gift from the Govern-

ment department issuing it. The State library is a federal depository for practically all documents published by the United States, and any which are out of print, or otherwise unobtainable, may be borrowed from the State library, through the Public Library.

"A particularly attractive publication of this kind is the "National Parks Portfolio," distributed by the Department of the Interior described in the Observer of Oct. 18. It is illustrated with a large number of unusually beautiful photographs.

"Other pamphlets recently received are the 'Care of Children Series,' from the Children's bureau.

"Others will be obtained on request. Many may be distributed to private individuals."

BIG KEEL IS LAID

Mare Island Navy Yard, Cal., Oct. 25.—(United Press)—In the presence of thousands of wildly cheering Californians, the keel of the Super-Dreadnaught California, the largest warship ever put under construction on the Pacific coast, was laid here at noon today. United States Senator James D. Phelan and officials of the Navy Yard represented the government, while Congressman Curry, Mayor James Roney of Vallejo and state and municipal officials formed the riveting gang that hammered the first rivets into place and began actual work of construction.

The ceremonies took place at noon, after the Battleship Oregon, famous "bulldog of the navy," and itself a product of a San Francisco Bay shipyard, brought the party of state and city officials, representatives of bay region cities, army and navy officers and scores of other prominent people.

Owing to the fact that the new ship is named after the Golden State and is being built in California, the ceremonies were largely attended by the Native Sons and Daughters of the Golden West. The State officers were members of the party aboard the Oregon and the members of nearby parlors were in attendance. The California Pioneers' society was also well represented.

It is the intention to launch the California in January, 1918. She will be christened and ready for a trial trip a year later.

The California's specifications are the latest ideas in naval construction, largely the result of careful study of naval engagements in the European war. The big ship has many features not to be found on ships now in service. The armoring of the vessel is planned to guard also against torpedo attacks and mines. Naval constructors believe that the ship will be impregnable against such attacks.

The Super-Dreadnaught will be 624 feet long, 96 feet in width and 47 feet, 2 inches deep. At her mean draft of 30 feet, 3 inches, she will have a displacement of 32,300 tons and will be capable of sustaining a speed of 21 knots an hour for 12 continuous hours.

The California's principal battery will be 12 14-inch 50-calibre breech-loading rifles. These guns are to be of an exceptionally powerful new type. They will be mounted in threes, in four center line turrets, which will be heavily armored. The remainder of the armament includes 23 5-inch rapid fire guns, 4 submerged torpedo tubes, 4 six-pounders (mainly for saluting), 4 3-inch anti-aircraft guns, 2 1-pounder guns for ship's boats, a 3-inch landing piece and several 30-calibre machine guns.

The California's machinery is to be operated by electricity. This will be furnished by mammoth generators, driven by oil-burning turbines. When fully manned the California will have a complement of 58 officers and 1,022 men.

TELOCASET SHIP'S OUT GRAIN

Good Dry Farming Country Has Big Wheat Yield for This Season.

G. I. Hess of Telocaset reports having shipped out about 20 car loads of grain this season from the warehouse at that place, says the Union Scout. The grain yield in that section was very good this season and the farmers all received a good price. A few years ago the land from which this year's crops were taken was all a barren waste of sage brush and

rocks and now the homesteaders are taking from \$40 to \$60 an acre from this same land. Union county dry farming land is hard to beat, when it comes to raising the big wheat crop and the wheat country in the vicinity of Telocaset will soon be one of the largest producing areas in the county.

Mr. Hess also reports an excellent business in the mercantile line this year which demonstrates that the farmers in that vicinity do not send their money to mail order houses.

The A. C. Hess & Sons planing mill at Telocaset is now running full blast and several car loads of finished lumber will be shipped from there this fall. Their saw mill has closed for the season finishing their run last Saturday.
