WILL REVERE MISSIONARIES

Whitman College, Walla Walla, Oct. 27.—(Special)—A celebration unique in the history of the Northwest will take place at Walla Walla on Wednesday, November first. The bodies of William H. Gray and his wife, the famous missionaries of 1836, have been removed from Astoria, Oregon, to Walla Walla, the Whitman Mission, and have been buried by the side of Dr. and Mrs. Whitman, thus, after eighty years re-uniting life-long friends. The Walla Walla Commercial club joins with Whitman college in setting apart the day in honor of these distinguished pioneers. A special train will be run to the Whitman Mission and interesting historical exercises will be held. Rev. John H. Boyd, D. D., minister of the First Presbyterian Church of Portland, will speak on the life and character of Mrs. Gray, one of the noblest and

most charming of pioneer women. Prof. W. D. Lyman, Litt. D., professor of history in Whitman College, will speak on the life and services of Mr. Gray who was secular agent of the Whitman Missionary party in 1836 and later the first historian of Oregon. The oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Gray, Captain William P. Gray, of Pasco will read a poem. The students of Whitman College will attend in a body and special music will be sung by the college choir and glee clubs.

All the living descendants of Mr. and Mrs. Gray are expected to be present. The exercises will be open to the public and a large number of Walla Walla people will attend, taking advantage of the special train which will return at noon.

The name and achievements of William H. Gray will ever be associated with those of his murdered friend, Dr. Marcus Whitman. They did not always agree in their points of view, each being a man of positive conviction and strong will, but their friendship continued until Dr. Whitman's tragic death in 1847, and Mr. Gray devoted the last ten years of his own life to securing funds for the erection of a Whitman monument.

Steel Products Expand.

New York, Oct. 27.—(Special)—The situation in steel products appears to constantly expand as time goes on. The trade hears of high premiums being paid jobbers by consumers for second hand rails, plates, railroad material, etc. An instance of conditions in steel is shown by the case wherein a jobber disposed of a goodly amount of rails, which when new cost no more than \$28 a ton. The next step in the proceedings occurred when the purchaser of the used rails turned over the whole tonnage again in export channels at a price close to \$35.00. Forms of speculation of this kind in job lots of steel is plainly due to the difficulty among speculators in securing the class of wares most in demand.

The whole situation in Wall Street indicates that its moods shift so rapidly that an active trader does not feel safe in taking off time for lunch.
