Tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 on the high school field the local boys will play their first interscholastic game for the championship of Eastern Oregon.

The outcome this year will not be decided until the last game is played as the teams are more evenly balanced than ever. Baker has won two games this year from Idaho teams and Pendleton lost to Walla Walla and won from Milton. La Grande was swamped by Walla Walla. According to the "dope" La Grande is due to be whipped at least 50 or 60 to 0 to morrow.

This is where the La Grande team enters to upset the dope. The team is rapidly developing fighting power and class and a continuation of their late efforts or if they play Saturday with the same spirit as they displayed on the field last night, will turn all dope completely.

Capt. Moon and Larson will play halves and are now working together in fine style. Much yardage will be crossed by these two plungers; where the pile is too thick Johnson will throw in his beef and bore through.

Reynolds will "bark" the signals and if he continues to use his head in the game, as he does in practice the supporters of the blue and white will have but little to worry about from that source.

Larson, Johnson and Andrews will form the secondary defense and, with their added experience and practice, will stop many plays before they are fairly started.

McDonald and Andrews will play ends on offense, Andrews trading with Reynolds on defense. Reynolds plays a better defensive end and Andrews a better defensive back. McDonald plays a "bear" of a game at end and his reach makes him ideal for receiving passes. Likewise he and Reynolds can collect the needed three points whenever the ball comes within the thirty-five yard line.

On the two tackles depends the outcome of the game. If these two huskies can stand up under Pendleton's bucks and cross bucks then La Grande will have a big chance. Chenault is big, strong and fast and should stop anything that comes his way unless in his over anxiousness he is fooled. Forbes is as good as Chenault for his weight but not so heavy, and is playing against Pendleton's biggest and best man, so will have his hands full, but it takes a good man to handle him.

"La Grande has fine guards—two for weight and two for speed. They will be used as the occasion demands. E. Moon and Carroll are ideal on a dry field. Ash and Woods would be better on a heavy field. All four will be used in the game.

When it comes to all-round fighting ability "Sing" Millering is a team by himself—he is by far the best defensive lineman in Eastern Oregon. He is under every play and makes more tackles than any man on the team. He makes an ideal center—rough and cool and can figure plays as soon as they start.
