Portland Commercial Club Man Affiliates with "Oregon Voter."

Portland, Oct. 28.—(Special).—On November 1st, M. E. Smead will sever his connection with the Portland Chamber of Commerce, and will thereafter assume the position of business manager for "The Oregon Voter." That paper thus secures two former employees of the Chamber of Commerce, C. C. Chapman being the founder and editor of the "Voter."

Through his management of such events as Buyers' Week, and the many excursions that the old Commercial club and present Chamber of Commerce ran to various points of the Northwest, Mr. Smead has formed a very wide acquaintance among business men, especially in Oregon.

Mr. Smead has been in commercial organization work for a number of years and has grown from a clerical position to that of assistant managing secretary of the largest commercial association in the state. He is considered a "wizard" at organizing big events, where large numbers of persons and interests participate. He is a native of Oregon and a graduate of Oregon Agricultural College.

Wilson Day Speech Made.

Shadow Lawn, Oct. 28.—(United Press)—President Wilson, speaking at the Wilson Day celebration today said much-needed reforms would be interrupted perhaps for generations if Republicans win the coming election. He reviewed Democratic records and reforms. He said: "And still the great fight is unfinished. You must decide election day whether the work will be prematurely interrupted and all generous forces of the age thrown back upon themselves in discouragement and confusion."

New York, Oct. 28.—(United Press)—Roosevelt has announced he would answer President Wilson's today's address tonight. He speaks at Brooklyn. Addresses at Cleveland, Toledo and New York and Baltimore conclude the campaigning.
