DESSERTS FOR CHILDREN.

Simple Nutritious Foods For Small Folks.

Philadelphia Tapioca Pudding.—Cover one cupful of flake tapioca with cold water and let it stand two hours, stirring occasionally with a fork to separate the lumps. Put in a farina kettle with one and one-half pints of water. Slice three tart apples and add to the tapioca, together with sugar to sweeten. Stir all together and cook until the apples are soft and the tapioca clear. Serve hot or cold with cream.

Irish Moss Blancmange.—One quart of milk, four tablespoonfuls of Irish moss and a little salt. Wash the moss in several waters and pick it over carefully. Put in a stewpan with the milk and a pinch of salt and bring to the boiling point. Then simmer a few moments or until it thickens when dropped on a cold plate. Strain and pour in a large mold or in individual molds dipped in cold water. Set in the icebox to harden and serve with cream and sugar.

Marshmallow Pudding.—Dissolve two teaspoonfuls granulated gelatin in one-half cupful hot water, strain, and when cool add one-fourth cupful sugar, a few drops of any flavoring desired and the unbeaten whites of two eggs. Beat all together about fifteen minutes, or until it thickens. Pour into a mold and serve with plain cream.

Orange Sponge.—Soak one teaspoonful of granulated gelatin in a little cold water for fifteen or twenty minutes, then stand it over hot water until thoroughly dissolved, add one-fourth cupful sugar, one-half cupful orange juice. Beat the white of one egg very stiff. Pour in the orange mixture and beat all thoroughly. Stand in a pan of ice water or in a cold place for fifteen or twenty minutes, then beat again. Turn into a mold or small dish and place on ice. Serve plain.

Fruit Whip.—Beat the white of one egg until it is dry, add one teaspoonful of sugar and two tablespoonfuls of strained fruit juice, raspberries, strawberries, blackberries, blueberries or peaches can be used, also strained apple sauce or stewed prunes. These fruit whips are easily made and are delicious.

Wraps For Winter.

Evening coats will be long enough to cover a short evening dress or a long trained evening dress held up. The fullness in the lower part of the coat in most of the models is enormous, and this tremendous yardage makes furs—even inexpensive ones—an item of expense. The bottom of a coat is frequently five yards or even six yards around and often trimmed with a deep band of fur like the collar. This great breadth is sometimes in the circular cut of the garment or is gored, or the graceful fullness is secured by shirring. Even the fur coats are luxuriously ample. There are huge arm sizes so that the coat may slip easily over evening gowns, short sleeves or tulle draperies.

Green Corn and Peppers.

Remove the seeds from green peppers, boil in salt and water twenty minutes, remove and chop fine. Boil ears of corn in the same water; when done cut from the cob. Put a large piece of butter in a saucepan, add the peppers and corn and heat thoroughly. Season to taste.
