THE FORUM

La Grande, Oct. 31.—(To Editor)—The campaign is coming to a close. If the people will do their duty and exercise their most sacred right of citizenship, the independent voting of their secret ballot, no one need fear the results. Especially is this true of the prohibition measure. If every citizen will go to the polls next Tuesday, November 7th, there is no doubt but that an overwhelming majority will vote 315 X No and defeat the Brewer's bill and 316 X Yes and carry the absolute prohibition measure. Both measures should be voted on.

"Wet" Circular Answered.
Under the disguise of "The Equal Rights to Home Industry Committee" the brewers have circulated a folder bearing the title "Dry Jokes and Real Facts" in which the only joke is the entire absence of any facts. This folder answers by evasion the generally admitted facts of prohibition in Oregon. But why argue the effects of prohibition when every intelligent voter can observe the improved and beneficial conditions for himself? Why argue that prohibition does not prohibit when both sides know that it does? It is a general fact that the laboring people, the merchants, manufacturers and the farmers of Oregon are all greatly pleased with the results of the Oregon dry law altho many voted against it two years ago. The only apparent issues in this campaign as far as prohibition is concerned is not whether prohibition is desirable, for the wets have waved and admitted that, but whether the people want absolute prohibition or wish to leave the law as it stands. However the brewers have framed a bill that they claim will alter the present law only in that it will permit the local brewer to sell beer under the same conditions as the outside brewer. This bill is in the form of a constitutional amendment worded to take the issue out of the hands of the people and solely in the control of the legislature.

Brewer's Amendment Analyzed.
Following are a few of the facts covered by the brewer's bill that the wets claims only to give the home brewer a square deal and should the measure pass these facts will be written in our state constitution.

Their "accidental" comma leaves five exceptions instead of four: Scientific, sacramental, medicinal, medicinal, and upon prescription.

Manufacture for export would make it easier for lawbreakers in our own and neighboring states.

Lawful to sell, etc., means that Oregon would become constitutionally "wet" like Ohio.

Delivery by the manufacturer means that beer could be handled as freely as gasoline—through "filling stations."

To any person or individual is "wider-open" than any license policy of any state. Children drunkards, insane persons, or criminals and their families, can be supplied without restriction.

Original package could be a five-cent bottle, with a cork-screw and tumbler loaned for the occasion.

As may be prescribed by law means that the "wets" will focus their attention on securing a wet legislature.

Until otherwise prescribed, delivery limited to present quantity, is simply a "blind" to fool the voters into voting for the most iniquitous amendment ever placed before the people.

But let us look at that circular again. The close is an appeal for the Brewer's bill. It reads as follows with the parenthesis inserted by the writer:

"What shall we do in Oregon? Shall we throttle her industries (asked at a time when mines, mills, railroads, shipbuildings, farming and all other lines of industry are expanding and enjoying great prosperity), destroy the hop grower (only two per cent of Oregon hops were ever used in Oregon and less than one township of area is now raising hops exclusively); still Oregon hops are bringing excellent prices on the market this fall, discourage the barley farmer (not when barley is selling at from \$1.50 to \$2.00), take employment from the needy (when the public schools have to dismiss their students in order to harvest the fruit crop)."

And so on down to the final and money end of the appeal. "Do you not think that the Oregon hop grower and brewer shall have at least the same privilege allowed outsiders, thereby keep Oregon money in Oregon?" To meet this argument the Drys have proposed a measure prohibiting the importation of liquor for beverage purposes, so instead of voting for the deceptive and rotten Brewer's bill vote 315 X No and 316 X Yes and keep all of the Oregon money in Oregon and for useful purposes. Following is the two measures as they will appear on the ballot, marked as they should be to defeat the Brewer's bill 315 X No, and to carry the absolute prohibition amendment 316 X Yes.

Initiated by Equal Rights for Home Industry Committee, C. E. S. Wood, Chairman, 254 Vista Avenue, Portland, Oregon; C. T. Haas, Secretary, 206 Stock Exchange Building, Portland, Oregon.—Permitting Manufacture and Regulated Sale Four Per Cent Malt Liquors—Purpose.—To amend Section 36, Article I, Oregon Constitution, which prohibits manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquor, by permitting the manufacture of fermented malt liquor containing four per cent or less of alcohol, for shipment outside of the state and for sale and delivery within the state by the manufacturer in original packages only, in quantities and under regulations which may be provided by law. Until otherwise provided such sales within the state shall be limited to the same quantity as may now be imported, but same person cannot, within any one period fixed by law, both import and buy locally.

SANTA ROSALIA IS CAPTURED

Villa Threatens To Go on to Parral and Slay Deserter.

El Paso, Oct. 31.—(United Press)—Villistas, under General Fernandez, have captured Santa Rosalia, 50 miles south of Chihuahua City. The Garzon fired a few shots and fled to the hills. The Villista army has seized three trains and are advancing southward against Jimenez and Parral. Military authorities expect a Jimenez attack shortly.

Villa has threatened to capture Parral and personally execute General Luis Herra, a former Villista, who has accepted Carranza's amnesty.

Governor Calles of Sonora, is en route to confer with Carranza but an explosion delayed him. Calles escaped but a bomb wrecked a freight close behind.

Wants to Limit Hours of Women's Work in Oregon

Portland, Oct. 31.—(Special)—Providing that women may not work for wages more than 48 hours a week, a bill will be introduced at the next session of the Oregon legislature at the Consumers' league, it was announced today following that organization's regular annual meeting. After its introduction, members of the league will work for the measure until it comes to vote.

The act is similar to the law now in force in California, except that it does not limit the hours of labor to eight a day. It is so worded that women may
