SOUP'S SECRETS.

The Art of Combining and Seasoning Just Right.

ADVICE FOR MRS. NEWLYWED.

An Expert Tells How to Set About Measuring, Cooking and Creaming Different Ingredients—Timely Tips For a Food That Winter Demands.

Soup is such a necessary adjunct to the well balanced meal that it deserves more care in its preparation than is usually accorded.

In serving soup remember that a hot, thin soup should be served with a hearty meal and a thick heavy soup should be served with a more simple one.

To make good soup the first requisite is a set of the necessary cooking utensils. These consist of a large agate ware or aluminum soup kettle with a close fitting cover, a sharp meat knife, two strainers, one with a fine mesh and one with a coarse one.

Onions, garlic, allspice and bay leaves; also red, white and black pepper, celery salt, sage, thyme and onion juice.

One should always keep in the pantry cornstarch, flour, rice, barley, sage, tapioca and arrowroot. Such vegetables as onions, celery, parsley, carrots, turnips and leek are often needed, but can be purchased in small quantities at any time of the year.

The capable cook or the careful housewife sees to it that soup stock has for its foundation good nourishing meat. Beef is perhaps best for the purpose, but any pieces of mutton or mutton bone, carcasses of fowls or "leftovers" can be used to advantage, and this fact makes soup an economical and satisfactory way of employing otherwise wasted materials, while the fat in marrowbones and the protein in skin and spongy rib bones help to form a healthful and strengthening liquid. The best rule for making soup stock is to put the ingredients in cold water, a pint of water to a pound of meat and bones; then bring this to a boil and let it simmer gently for a long time.

The steam which rises to the top after the simmering should be removed, and the vegetables, herbs and seasoning should be added during the last hour and a half of the prolonged simmering. Then strain and cool rapidly and do not skim off the fat which forms on the surface until about to use the stock, as it excludes the air.

Such stock can be used as the basis of a great many soups by the addition of different seasonings and flavorings. Cream soups are made by adding the pulp of vegetables or fish to milk or milk and cream. The main ingredient, whether tomatoes, celery, potatoes or onions or anything else, is first cooked with seasoning, then passed through a strainer and returned to the fire with the addition of the milk. It should then be thickened with a little flour and butter, the proportions being a quart of liquid, a pint of vegetable pulp, two tablespoonfuls each of flour and butter.
