Chicago, Nov. 2.—(United Press)—Discovery of what may prove to be the germ of infantile paralysis was announced here by Dr. Maximilian Herzog. If the experiments are supported by later evidence, the conclusions of Dr. Flexner of the Rockefeller Institute will be upset. The work was done by Dr. Herzog as head of the research committee appointed by Dr. John Dill Robertson here and his investigation was carried on at the Cook county hospital largely. With the newly discovered germ or coccus, Dr. Herzog has produced the disease in monkeys and rabbits. It is possible however that this germ is simply the carrier of a smaller one, which actually causes the disease.
